Pilot Of World Champion Cardinals Is Named As Manager Of The Year

St. Louis, Dec. 29 (AP)—Championship success of St. Louis Cardinals was reflected today in the selection by the Sporting News of Branch Rickey as the No. 1 executive of the year and Billy Southworth as the outstanding manager in major league baseball.

Without denying Joe Gordon's claims to honors as the most valuable player in the American League, the Sporting News weekly passed the honor of the year to the outstanding manager in major league baseball.

Williams and Southworth are the first in the annual citations to be named two years in succession. Rickey was selected in 1936.

In the minor leagues, Bill Veeck, President of Milwaukee of the American Association; Ed Dyer, Manager of Columbus of the same league; and Dick Barrett, pitcher with Seattle of the Pacific Coast League, were named the No. 1 men of the year.

Dyer received top ranking for leading Columbus Red Birds successfully through the American Association play-offs and in the Little World Series with Syracuse of the International League.

Veeck was hailed for promoting the revival of baseball interest in Milwaukee. Barrett, a veteran of 16 seasons in professional baseball, was selected because of his record of striking only 172 earned runs last season, the best effort in either the majors or the minors, his 27 victories against 13 losses, and his league leadership with 176 strikeouts.

The 35-year-old pitcher has been purchased by Chicago Cubs.

Prince of Wales Winners Over Montague 3-2

Monday night, the Prince of Wales Hockey team, minus several players from the western part of the island journeyed to Montague and came off with a thrilling 3-2 victory.

The Montague team, led by Vince Grant, Chr. Chris Gallant opened the scoring midway through the second period, showing the puck through a wild scramble in front of the P. W.C. net. The College team began to pick up its play, but their best passing plays were held in check for the remainder of the period, despite several close calls.

During the third period, the Montague team in spite of their abundance in manpower, began to show signs of tiring, and after ten minutes of play, Ed Bagnall took a pass-out from Pud Beer to tie the score. Beer put the College ahead, as he slickheaded in alone, but Vince Grant, whose tallspin rushes were a feature all night, tied the score for Montague a minute later.

The city boys were not to be denied, however, and from that point on, took complete command of the effective play. After having wave upon wave of attacks ruined by erratic work around the opposing net, the pay-off came when D. Bagnall took a pass from M. Beck and broke away, tangling the defence, as Bill Hodgson, rugged P. W. C. defence star, raced around to slam in the rebound. The goal was vigorously protested, but was allowed to stand.

As the game ended, Prince of Wales were still storming the opposing net with a shower of rubber.

For Montague, Grant, Gallant and Beck were standouts with their fast breaks, which rendered the defence impossible. Rangers Hand Bruins First Home Defeat

BOSTON, Dec. 29 (AP)—The rehabilitated New York Rangers, thanks to the superb goal-tending of their Jim Patrick, defeated the Bruins 5-3 tonight for the Bruins' first home setback in 11 starts during the current National Hockey League season.
