PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

Thursday Morning.

House met at 11.15. Hon. Mr. Peters resumed his speech on the Draft Address asserting that the delegates to Ottawa pressing the claims of the Province did not represent anybody. Although appointed at a Convention under the auspices of the Boards of Trade it is strange that only three out of the seven went to Ottawa. He emphatically denied the rumor that he had persuaded the remainder to stay at home. This wonderful convention, for he could call it nothing else, had the temerity, he would almost call it audacity, to invite three of the members of the Legislature to join.

Although a small province the members of this Government had sufficient self respect not to be dictated by an irresponsible body. True the delegation was given a cordial reception but this is accorded every delegation. When the Local Government in due time send their delegates they would go as a responsible body, not as an irresponsible body—a "mongrel delegation". He proposed to go with the evidences of the Captains of the boats on the Straits of MacKinaw and would urge that the contract be fully carried out. He would show the Dominion Government that the contract could be fully carried out and he had sufficient confidence that the Government would then implement the terms of the union. He would only ask for a tunnel when it was proven that no boat could carry out the winter service on the Straits. Dealing with the representation question he thought that the costs of the case before the Privy Council would likely be paid by the Dominion Government. The question of the adjustment of the subsidy was now a live one and even now the Premier of Quebec has spoken definitely on the question. If the re-adjustment is made for Quebec it must be for all the Provinces. The government would be authorized by an act to fund the public debt and borrow money at a lower rate of interest and thus effect a saving to the province. As far as the questions regarding the hay, etc. he told the Leader of the Opposition that the full returns would be submitted in the course of a day or two.

Mr. Fraser congratulated the mover of the address, whom he strongly lauded. He spoke on the question of exhibitions and the improvement of winter roads. He advocated having a Minister of Education on the floor of the House who would be responsible to the Legislature. He found no fault with the present Superintendent but still there were faults in the system. He faulted the Government for having the Representation case bracketed with that of New Brunswick who put it in the worst possible light. The Island stood to lose all its representation by the growth of the other provinces; this was not fair and he had no doubt but it would be remedied when the time came. The Premier had repudiated the Fishery Award stories in The Patriot which were as other "fish" stories. He (Mr. Fraser) was amazed at the statement that the Minister of Justice had no idea of equity—that he was altogether ignorant of such which did not exist in Quebec. Now he (Premier Peters) has gone back to the Supreme Court which cannot try any but a "legal" claim and he has previously asserted that we have no "legal" claim but an "equitable" claim. Hon. Mr. Prefontaine had said definitely in the House of Commons that the Government has no intention of paying the Fishery Award, of submitting it to the Supreme Court, or of sending it to the Privy Council. The Premier has made repeated promises.—

Hon. Mr. Peters—"I made no promises." Mr. Mathieson—"That is better than it used to be." Proceeding Mr. Fraser, in answer to a statement by Mr. Prefontaine saying the Fishery Question was still pending, again quoted from Hansard giving the replies of the Minister of Marine to Mr. Martin's question.

Mr. Agnew contended that the House was more inclined to accept the written statement of Mr. Prefontaine on the Fishery Question than his answer in Parliament. The hay had been fairly dealt out in his district both political parties admitted. He was in favor of County exhibitions when it was possible to hold them.

Mr. McDonald referred to the satisfactory nature of the discussion of the Draft Address in which the country would take a great interest. He condemned the Government for placing hay distribution in the hands of the political hangers-on. The Opposition had urged County exhibitions and he was glad to see that such was favored by the new members. He had never expected to get a share of the Fishery Award and so was not now disappointed. In its past distribution Prince Edward Island has suffered and Nova Scotia has gained.

Mr. McMillan congratulated his colleague, the Speaker, upon his elevation to that high position and the Premier on his large support from the country. The hay had been fairly distributed mainly through the Farmers' Institutes which were composed of both sides of politics. If there was one thing more than another that had made the Government popular it was procuring the hay for the farmers of the Province. He gave credit to the Premier for his efforts in the Fishery Award question and was in favor of one Provincial Exhibition which had been the past two years a great success owing principally to the indefatigable efforts of the President, Mr. Haszard, who was entitled to much praise.

Hon. Mr. Haszard dealt with the three principal questions before the House, the Representation case, the Fishery Award and the hay. The Leader of the Opposition had faulted the Premier on the Representation question but the Government were not to blame for the N. B. and P. E. I. cases being bracketed together. He believed, and he was sure the country believed, that the government had done everything possible in this matter. But all hope has not gone and in the changing of the Provincial boundaries justice will be done and a re-arrangement of the representation probably made.

The Fishery Award case, he believed, would be settled as soon as possible. The Dominion Government will move very reluctantly in parting with this money but he had no doubt when it is shown that we have a legal or an equitable right the Federal Government will deal justly with us. He did not think a statement regarding the "legal" claims made on the House or elsewhere by the Premier would be used against us in a settlement of the case. The hay question had met with much discussion. The Government had been faulted for not arranging sooner but when the Government took the matter up, there was little thought throughout the Province of a serious shortage. There have been delays owing to unprecedented stoppage of navigation but everything possible has been done to get it here as quickly as possible. He knew of no place where there was unfair treatment in distribution of the hay and if there were any cases they would be very few. House adjourned at one o'clock.
