Warns Cream Of Youth Being Lost To Reds

Canadian Press Business Editor VANCOUVER, Oct. 26 (CP) — The man who represents 20,000 young Canadian business executives warned today that the cream of Canada's youth is being lost to Communists and Socialists.

P. T. R. Pugsley of Montreal, Junior Chamber president, told the 19th annual meeting of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce that the "pinkie fold" has taken youth and put it to work.

"While Communists and left-wing Socialists for years have worked day and night to advertise and sell the form of serfdom they believe will bring the millennium, Canadian business has spent a relative pittance advertising and selling its way of life," he said.

"So today you have the situation, that thousands of young Canadians in the teaching professions, in the clergy, and in many other posts of power, are not only sold on the products which Canadian business is still permitted to provide to them, but also on the need for a radical and prompt change in the ownership of the means of production."

Five hundred delegates—top industrialists—gathered today at the three-day convention which led to action. The men represent the 570 senior Chambers and Boards of Trade and their 80,000 membership.

A process of evolution, correcting faults, eliminating abuses, in forming the people of the merits of Canadian democracy, was given as an objective to the Chamber by D. L. Morrell, Montreal, executive secretary, in his annual report.

And C. Bruce Hill, of St. Catharines, president, declared in a luncheon address: "We are opposed to Socialism but not to social measures. Let us tell the people what and why."

"Let us tell the Labor Union that not only are we in favor of collective bargaining, but we pledge our support to those unions which do good job for labor and their particular industry."

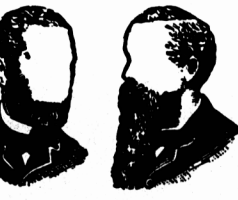

Promising Bird Dog Is Killed By Car

Probably the most promising bird dog in the Maritimes, Ollie Harper's English pointer puppy, Fritz's Brownie, was killed by an unidentified car while hunting last Monday morning.

The gift of sportsmen from New Hampshire, Brownie had won the Puppy Stakes at the recent Hunt Trials with an outstanding performance against the top Brittany Spaniel entries from the U. S. and was unanimously accepted by the judges and visiting trainers as the best they had seen this season.

Describing the circumstances of the accident, Mr. Harper stated that they left the main road at the cemetery at Clyde River. Going the side road towards West River Bridge about a mile, they started to hunt and covered two pasture fields into a grainfield. Being back about 300 yards, his trainer did not realize that the grainfield bordered the main road, nor that there was no fence between the field and the road. This latter fact was Brownie's undoing for she had never gone through a fence without her trainer's permission and did not realize the danger of the road.

An old model car was travelling in the direction of the dog, which was standing parallel to the direction of the road into the wind and well on the side of the road. Although not travelling fast, the car seemed to lurch on the forty-foot road when it reached the dog and, missing her with its front wheel, struck her with the rear wheel and killed her instantly.

The car slowed up and the two women and man inside were seen to look back and the car gathered speed and was gone before anyone could get its number.

Local dog enthusiasts have expressed their sympathy with Mr. Harper in his loss.

Jockey Draws Sweep Ticket

NEWMARKET, England, Oct. 26 (CP) — Leo (Jock) Carson, 21-year-old jockey, will put a personal problem to the steward before the Cambridgeshire handicap is run tomorrow.

Here's his problem: Final card to ride Brink in the big race. But he holds a sweepstake ticket on Wisley, one of the favorites. If Wisley wins, Carson would collect £10,000 (\$40,000).

"I am not going to make a secret of it," said Carson. "I am surprised to hear that the ticket had drawn a horse — and in my profession it would be most embarrassing if Wisley and Brink became engaged in a close finish."

"Suppose I ride the race of my life on Brink but Wisley beats me? What would everyone say?"

If the stewards advise Carson to go ahead and ride Brink, he will also tell his troubles to owner J. Hamer and trainer Billy Carr before saddling up. If they tell him it's okay, he'll ride — but with the weight of worry on his mind.

CBC To Decide On Television

OTTAWA, Oct. 27 (CP) — The CBC board of governors is scheduled to decide this week whether television should be given the go-ahead signal in Canada.

The board meets in camera tomorrow to deal with Corporation business. Thursday and Friday it will hold public sessions. High on the agenda are six applications seeking permission to introduce television in Toronto and Montreal.

It is expected the Board will make recommendations on at least some of the applications.

One application came from OKEY in Toronto. Jack Kent Cooke, publisher of New Liberty magazine, appeared before the board and said the profits of the station and, if necessary, some of the profits of the magazine would be used in the development of a television outlet for OKEY.
