British Yachts Come by Steamer for Cup Contest
NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—The Rose one of the English yachts which will compete in the British-American cup contest on Long Island Sound, commencing on Sept. 9, will arrive on Saturday on the deck of the Cunard liner Scythia, and will be sailed by her designer, C. Nicholson, also the designer of Shamrock IV., which contested for the America's Cup.
There are three other yachts of the same size—twenty feet—on the way over, one more on the Scythia and two on the Caronia. They are the Joan, owned by John Ward; the Reg, owned by Norman Clark-Neill, and the Colia III, designed and built by F. J. Stephens.
The Jean, which took part in last year's races, will be sailed by Sir Ralph Gore; the Reg will be in the hands of Capt. R. T. Dixon, while John Stephens will be at the Colia's helm.
