Canada's New Sulphur Industry

To the average person, the mention of sulphur usually conjures up the memory of that particularly obnoxious tonic which, in youth, marked the advent of Spring. But, to the chemical engineer, sulphur represents one of the most useful and interesting raw materials offered to man by Mother Nature.

When you sit down to work at a desk that is painted or stained, and all probably you are, so to speak, working on sulphur. In the United States, during 1937, paints and pigments represented the seventh largest user of sulphur. There were 105,000 tons of sulphur used in the popular new titanium pigments. Lacquers, such as you may use to brighten up your car, contain sulphur. Soap, about a pound to every five gallons of lye, contains sulphur. 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Reorganization Viewed With Uncertainty

Pictou County Appreciative For Industries In New Dosco Plans.

NEW GLASGOW, N. S., July 26—Uncertainty prevails in Pictou County industrial towns as reorganization of the county's great coal-iron industry hangs in the air.

Apprehensions about the future of the industry was first felt among more than 1,500 workers when negotiations for reorganization of Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company became known early this year. Repeated assurances by the Nova Scotia Government and Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation that everything possible would be done to protect the mining industry have failed to dispel this feeling.

It was Dosco which made the proposal for reorganization of the Scotia Company, and which, under the projected plan, is a prospective purchaser of Acadia Coal Company, a Scotia subsidiary and the country's largest employer of mine labor.

Controlled By Dosco
The Scotia Company is controlled by Dosco which owns all of its \$15,000,000 common share issue. Under the reorganization plan, Scotia bonds would be exchanged for new bonds bearing a lower rate of interest and secured on the Scotia Company properties. Other Scotia securities would be exchanged for Dosco stock. Interest and sinking funds of the new bonds would come from the lease rentals of Scotia's vast iron ore deposits at Wabana, Nfld. Dosco, lessor of the ore mines, will pay an annual rental of \$5,000,000 for the lease on all ore mined from the leased areas in excess of 450,000 tons.

Submission of the report of a Royal Commission which investigated the Acadia situation, and court approval of the reorganization is still pending. An application to approve the liquidators of Scotia in concurring in the plan has been placed before the court. The company has been in the hands of receivers-liquidators since 1933 and a permanent stay of liquidation proceedings is being sought.

More than 25,000 people are dependent on the steady operation of the county's two industries. Steel mills and a car plant here and in nearby Trenton, operated by the Scotia Company, are large employers of labor.

Should the corporation become owner of Acadia Coal Company under the plan of the parent company's reorganization, President Cross of the parent company, an inevitable substantial curtailment of operations in the Pictou County coal fields. Though a statement authorized by the President promises that the parent company will be viewed with a view to developing and opening new coal fields as it might be found possible to finance and operate, it also hinted at "an early cessation of production in the Albion and Allan shafts of Stellarton, where the bulk of the county's mine labor is employed. Production in the latter shafts will be discontinued as a result of the cessation of operations in the fact that some of the mines are drawing close to the end of their productive life. Another cause is that presented by the fact that when he pointed out that over a period of six years, Acadia coal operations have resulted in an average annual loss of \$283,000.

Pictou County miners are more interested in pay envelopes than balance sheets. The United Mine Workers which runs the mine labor of the district, has two other mines in the county. These mines, which work from the same deposit as Acadia, pay higher wages and each year have an operating surplus. Mr. Bruce Gamble, contractor being in charge of the work.

H. P. Duchenin Returns From England

MONCTON, N. B., July 25—Business in Great Britain is good except in the mining industry, in all other lines there is a shortage of skilled labor, stated H. P. Duchenin, publisher of the Sydney Post Record and president of the Canadian Press when passing through Moncton today on the Oceanic Railway enroute back to Sydney on his return from overseas where he appeared before the Privy Council in connection with the question of the freedom of the press in Alberta.

Mr. Duchenin said he heard very little was talk in England. In fact so far as he could ascertain the general opinion seemed to be that there was no immediate danger of any general European war. He gathered general news services between Great Britain and Canada. Mr. Duchenin stated that in the London office of the Canadian Press Canada had the most efficient news gathering and distributing bureau which received from and distributed to the great world news-gathering agencies general world and Canadian news respectively.

Speaking of his travel experiences, Mr. Duchenin declared that nowhere did he find any railway service superior to that of Canada's nationally owned system and in several respects he found it superior. Mr. Duchenin was accompanied by Mrs. Duchenin.

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
