FRIDAY

PRESENTATION—Major Goodwill who left yesterday morning for St. John, on the Overseas was conducted to the P. E. I. SUPREME COURT—In the Supreme Court, Summerside, on Wednesday, the case came up in which a young man named William Sonier, was charged with having assaulted an old man named Cahill so as to cause him actual bodily harm. They were examined and withdrew his plea of "not guilty", and substituted that of being guilty, and the jury found true bills against Isaac Peters on two counts and against Ramsay (who pleaded guilty) while they returned no bill against David W. SERIOUS FIRE—The dredge Edward Hall, No. 1 was burned to the water's edge yesterday, and is now a total loss. The fire started about 5 o'clock yesterday morning, the cause of the outbreak being unknown. She underwent repairs a few weeks ago at L. M. Poole & Co's works, preparatory to beginning dredging operations at York Point. The Hall was a dipper dredge, dredging 2 1/2 cubic yards at a dip. She was valued at about \$50,000. She came to the Island two years ago and worked around Murray Harbor and other points for the Dominion Department of Public Works before proceeding to Charlottetown. Her work at Rocky Point was just completed before the fire occurred.

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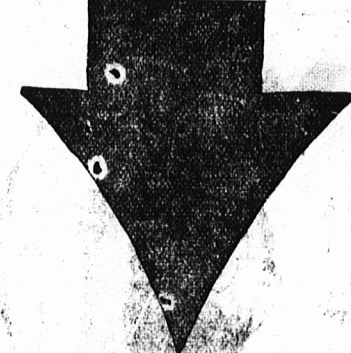
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FOR THE BOYS IN FRANCE—As far as loving thoughts, careful consideration and an abundance of gifts can make it, this Christmas will be merry and happy one for the gallant boys in France.
