Sudden Death of Dr. Donald Darrach

Kensington, and indeed the province was shocked on learning of the sudden death of Dr. Darrach, of Kensington, which occurred at one o'clock yesterday morning. The doctor had been in his usual health almost up to the hour of his death. On the previous night he was attending to his business as usual and after retiring was seized with a pain in the region of the heart. Mrs. Darrach wanted to send for a doctor, but he assured her the trouble was not serious. Later, however, his condition grew suddenly alarming but before medical aid could be summoned he passed away.

The late Dr. Darrach was born in West River, on October 25, 1845, and was therefore in his 77th year. He was educated in the district school in his native settlement and when 17 years of age won the two years scholarship for the College in Prince of Wales. He was a student in the University of Toronto, where he distinguished himself in his course of study. He was a member of the late Dr. Hammond Johnson's medical studies in the Harvard Medical College, graduating from both and becoming a member of the Massachusetts Medical Society. He began the practice of his profession in Margate, this province and later opened a drugstore in Kensington. Both in his private and in his business life he was successful and successful. He was a member of the Mercantile firm of Reuben Tappin & Co., which he purchased and conducted successfully till the time of his death.

The late Dr. Darrach was during his long residence in Kensington, an outstanding figure in the community. Honorable, upright in every walk of life, generous where aid, personal or financial, was needed, he was looked upon as "the man who helps" in every worthy cause. He was a liberal supporter of the Presbyterian and Methodist churches in Kensington and was for many years a teacher in the Methodist Sunday School. He was for twenty years a trustee and a staunch friend of the Kensington High School, a school which owes much of its success to his friendship and help. He was the first Mayor of Kensington after the incorporation of the town and successfully held offices of trust and usefulness in the town. He was one of the best educated men in Masonry in Canada, having passed through the thirty-third degree and was a member of the Mystic Shrine.

The late Dr. Darrach will be greatly missed, not only in Kensington but wherever he was known. Friendly, compassionate, generous to a fault, he was all that is included in the expression, "a good citizen."

Dr. Darrach leaves to mourn his wife, formerly Miss Trypanena, daughter of the late Mr. Reuben Tappin; one daughter, Mrs. Ben Tappin; one daughter, Mrs. (Dr.) J. F. McNeill, Summerside; and three sons, Waldron, Don and Ian to all of whom The Guardian tenders sincere sympathy.

Mr. C. B. Murley Passed Away

The unexpected death of Mr. C. B. Murley, which took place late Monday night, came as a shock to his many friends in this city where he was so well and favorably known.

Mr. Murley, who conducted a printing office on Queen St., was feeling well on Monday and partook of supper as usual at six o'clock. About eight o'clock he complained of pains and medical aid was immediately summoned. He appeared to recover somewhat and was advised by his physician to retire for the night. Shortly after he became unconscious and remained so until he passed away.

The late Mr. Murley was born in Charlottetown in 1867, and learned the bookbinding trade with the Brenner Bros. On completing his apprenticeship he accepted the position of foreman in the bindery department in the office of Mr. John Coombs. In 1893 he and Mr. B. J. Garnum took over the business which they conducted under the name of Murley and Garnum. In 1911 Mr. Garnum retired and the business was continued by Mr. Murley until his death.

In military affairs the late Mr. Murley also took a prominent and active part; joining the old 4th Regt. as a private he won promotion until he attained the rank of Company Sergeant Major, which he held until he retired some few years ago. He at all times was

placed on teams competing at the Island of Orleans, Quebec. About thirty-five years ago he became associated with the Fire Department, and in this, as in the militia won advancement. For a number of years he was captain of the Hook and Ladder Company and some few years ago was appointed assistant-chief which position he held at the time of his death.

The late Mr. Murley was a faithful member of Zion Church and for many years a valued member of the choir. He married Miss Catherine Brown, who survives him, on Feb. 26, 1902. She will have the heartfelt sympathy of the community in her bereavement.

Three sisters, Mrs. J. A. Ritchie, Mrs. Geo. Ledwith and Mrs. Hedley Anderson, and four brothers, Howard and Isaac in the city, Richard in Murray Harbor and Rev. William, in Wisconsin are also left to mourn.

The funeral, which will be under the auspices of the Firemen will be held this afternoon at 2.30.

THE "DUMBELLS" TONIGHT AT THE PRINCE EDWARD
