THE MINISTER OF RAILWAYS.

Hon. H. R. Emerson as Minister of Railways and as the one member of the Laurier Cabinet whose home and constituency is nearest to us, takes a friendly interest in Prince Edward Island, and we are very glad to have him visit us again.

Our entire railway system is under the control and direction of Mr. Emerson and his Department, and we believe he has a sincere desire to make its management as efficient and as satisfactory to our people as he can, consistent with those ideas of somewhat rigid economy to which the government is for the time committed.

We believe our people are fully aware of the importance of retaining the state railways under Government control, and they are also seized of the fact that a determined effort has been made to transfer these valuable properties to one or other of the great railway companies.

Mr. Emerson has strenuously opposed such transfer and in so doing he has established a strong claim upon our favor and regard. He finds it necessary, however, if Government control and management are to be continued, to maintain that equilibrium between revenue and operating expenses which he has so happily established.

We doubt not therefore that the Minister will be met by our shippers and business men in a fair and friendly spirit and that he on his part will be disposed to do the best he can for us. It cannot be expected that the Island Railway will be made self-sustaining as the Intercolonial now is. It is an isolated system, competing constantly with cheap water carriage in summer and largely cut off from through business by our ice-bound conditions in winter.

That Mr. Emerson, who is a fair-minded man, will give due weight to these exceptional circumstances. May we not also hope that he will be the more desirous now to please the people of Charlottetown, from having subjected us to a previous disappointment in the matter of the station site? At least we shall hope for the best until we have reason to do otherwise.

A FRENCH EXPLANATION.

Taken at consideration with the various hints and suggestions put forth on many sides regarding the proposed reduction of navy estimates in Great Britain the utterance of Depeche, Paris, on the subject appears to be worthy of consideration.

It is stated that England will find herself in great danger if Germany's naval program is carried out, and if in 1910 the Emperor William's projected squadrons are ready to take the offensive. England is firmly decided to stop this at any price. She believes herself to have found the way; by a make-believe disarmament. If Germany takes the hint, very well; if she resists, England has a right to treat her as she formerly treated Holland, France and Spain.

It appears that the Intercolonial pass question is not yet decided and that the employes are by no means satisfied with the concessions made, and that further concessions are to be prayed for. A return to the old system, with the abuses eliminated is asked for. The claim of the employes is that they are not responsible for the abuses which brought about the change from the old system.

The point of view of the employes, as well as of others more or less interested is perhaps best illustrated by the following story:

A railway man was in the habit of applying each Saturday for a pass to transport him to his home, which was some distance up the line.

At last objection was made to granting the pass. He was told: "If I were a farmer you would not expect me to hitch up my team every Saturday to take you to your home free of charge."

"No," replied the employe, "but if your team were driving by my door every Saturday evening I would think you of a very mean man if you refused me a lift."

And we have very little doubt but that Mr. Emerson if he were in the farmer's place, would be very willing to give any person who was working for him a lift along the road. With much more reason should he do the same for the employes of his Government Railway.
