Familiar Figures Again Take Seats In New Parliament

OTTAWA, Aug. 5.—Like all new Parliaments, the next House of Commons will see the advent of many new members, but at the same time a considerable number who were once familiar figures around Parliament Hill will return. The lure of politics, is irresistible; many a resolute intention to abandon the thankless sphere of political activity has been dissipated by the call of the sirens. Great party stalwarts have from time to time taken their farewell of the parliamentary stage with the frequency of prima donnas. Fortunately for the interest which the people of Canada derive from following the progress of their public men, the 17th Parliament will contain a good proportion of members who in the "old days" loomed prominently in the national councils. Whether the influence they then exercised has been projected down to the present is something that remains to be seen.

Regarded years ago as the "enfant terrible" of Canadian politics, Armand Lavergne, successful Conservative candidate in Montmagny, Que., re-enters the House following an absence of many years. The Nationalist movement in Quebec, of which Mr. Bourassa was the commander-in-chief, is recalled by the election of the latter. As an orator the member for Montmagny, has an impressive delivery, a genius for the apt metaphor and a power to summon from an inexhaustible imagery the most appropriate of parables. For years the House of Commons has been without orators of first-class calibre and the advent of Mr. Lavergne may once again supply what the book-reviewers are wont to term "a long felt want."

Hon. Robert Rogers once more comes out of the west to take his place in Parliament. The career of Mr. Rogers has been replete with interest, one of unusual activity. Few names are more familiar than his in the contemporary politics of Canada associated as it is with rugged battles both inside and outside the House of Commons. A colorful figure, Mr. Rogers was peevish and his energy was limitless.

Much Speculation In Appointment Of Commissioner

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 5.—The decision that Hon. R. E. Bennett and his new Cabinet will make as to whether or not Hon. Vincent Massey is to go to London as High Commissioner for Canada, will be eagerly awaited. Constitutional lawyers when approached as to what action should be taken, declined to express opinions on the ground that it was a matter of policy, not one governed by any constitutional provision.

Lord Strathcona was appointed by a Conservative Government. When the Laurier Government came into power, he was retained and remained in office throughout its long term of power. The return of the Borden Government brought no change.

When the King Government came into power in 1921, Sir George Perley at once cabled Mr. King asking to be permitted to resign his post as soon as it could be convenient for the new Government to dispense with his services. Premier King later granted Sir George's request.

One of the leading Conservatives here today took the view that there was a difference between a man established in a position and one that of a man who has not yet taken over the position. While technically there is no difference in the status, he was of the opinion that it would be considered an actual difference when the new Cabinet takes the matter up.

Conflicting Stories Told Of The Sudden Dangers Which Beset R-100 Over Quebec

AUG. 5.—The officers and men told ST. HUBERT AIRPORT, Montreal, different stories today about the storm damage done the dirigible R-100 shortly before it completed its 3,500-mile flight from England early this morning.

And the story of the men was one to make the heart quicken with thanksgiving that the peril was past, a peril that struck with the speed and ferocity of a serpent.

For the men, a dozen of them who dropped into the hangar press room to cable relatives at home or telephone friends in this country, told of a "cyclonic current" that buffeted the ship from beneath the other side of Quebec and hurled it upward, practically standing on its nose, for almost 2,500 feet in less than half a minute.

It was during that terrific moment, when all aboard "just crossed their fingers and waited," according to some of the eye-witnesses, that a strip of fabric about 15 by six feet was ripped from the port fin, opening a hole as big as a barn door into the great envelope, exposing the intricate interior of the largest airship ever built to the fury of the storm.

MINIMIZE DANGER

In radio reports from the ship itself yesterday and in interviews after the dirigible was moored today, officers minimized the dangers that had been encountered. They said the peril had never been critical and the jury repairs effected in mid-air rendered the damage of negligible importance.

But the men, who spoke informally and were not told in advance, as were the officers, that they were talking for publication, scoffed at the suggestion that there had been no serious danger and point for evidence at the rude patch that but partially closed the jagged opening and almost covered the fluttering tatters of the airship's torn "skin."

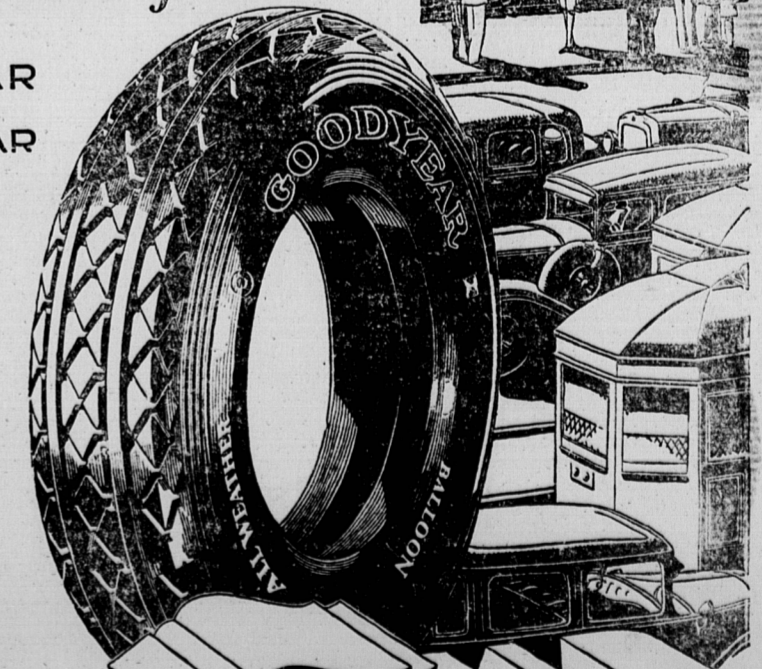
