## LOCAL BRIEFS

THE Stanley brought 20 bags of mail last evening.

SUPR. SHARP of the P. E. I. Railway, returned via the Stanley last evening.

THE Str. Jacques Cartier will not sail for Orwell today on account of the ice.

MR. TARBUSH of the High Grade Art Studio, returned via the Stanley last evening.

THE Elliott has sailed for New York where she will engage in the fruit trade.

THE schooner A. J. McKean, of the Portland Packing Co., sails today for Cape Town, with supplies for their factories.

MR. HOWARD DUTCHER, of Charlottetown, formerly of this city, is a passenger on the Manchester Enterprise for England.—St. John Globe.

MR. PERCY L. WRIGHT, formerly of Bedeque, who brought the remains of his sister Miss Lotte Wright to the Island for burial, is at the Queen Hotel on return to Maiden Mass.

At the Police Court yesterday forenoon further evidence was heard in the prosecution against Frank Murphy, for forgery. A number of witnesses were examined after which the prisoner was charged and pleaded "Not Guilty." He was sent up for trial in the Supreme Court on four different charges.

MR. A. E. ALEXANDER the well known North Shore lumberman has asked for tenders for a large mill to be built near Hampton. A SAD and serious loss by fire, took place at French Fort, Lot 35, on Sabbath evening, when the barn and other outbuildings of Mr. Wallace Owen were burned to the ground, together with ten head of cattle, fifteen pigs and fifty hens. A new threshing mill, faners, two carts, truck and all other farming implements required on a first-class farm, 150 bushels oats and a lot of hay and straw, indeed everything about the barn except the horses were burned. Much sympathy is felt for the young man and the rest of the family. He is a son of the late Christopher Owen, who was killed by an accident on the St. Peter's Road, when Wallace was only a child. The family had by perseverance secured for themselves a comfortable home until the sad accident happened. The family had just gone to church when the fire took place. The neighbors had a hard time to save the dwelling house from the flames. Cause of fire unknown. The loss is estimated at \$1000. Insurance \$200 in the P. E. I. Agricultural Mutual Ins. Co'y.

GEORGE'S DAY CELEBRATION.—The Sons of England in this city, celebrated St. George's Day, last evening in their rooms, by a grand musical and literary entertainment, followed by a supper served in caterer, W. Some 80 couples did ample justice to the array of good things that covered the bountiful tables after which the thanks of the committee in charge, were given to the several performers, and to Principal Miller for the use of his spacious rooms in which the supper was held. ON Thursday evening Rev. Clarence McKinnon is to be inducted into the pastoral charge of Park street Presbyterian church Halifax. He is son of the late Rev. John McKinnon who was for a good many years pastor of the Presbyterian church at Hopewell Pictou county. A writer in the New Glasgow Bulletin recalls the interesting fact that Rev. John McKinnon was licensed by the Presbytery of Pictou in Prince street church, Pictou, S. p. 1, 1858, and was ordained into the pastoral charge of Hopewell congregation on the 29th of the same month. Those who officiated at the ordination were Rev. George Patterson, Rev. George Roddick, Rev. James Bayne and Rev. George Walker. All have passed away except Rev. George Roddick, who is now living at Brasovon, Man. Of the other members of pre-bytery who were present on the occasion, so far as is known, only one other minister besides Mr. Roddick, is living.—Rev. James Thompson, of Durham, West River. Rev. John McKinnon ministered to Hopewell congregation for upwards of twenty years, and after demitting his charge ministered for a number of years to the Presbyterian congregation of Georgetown P. E. I., and then went home to Scotland, where he passed away to his rest. There is every reason to believe that Rev. Clarence McKinnon is a worthy son of a worthy father, and that he will prove a worthy successor of Rev. Allan Simpson, who retired from the pastorate of that congregation some time ago.
