Alex Pantage Is Acquitted

(Canadian Press) LOS ANGELES, Calif., Nov. 27.-Amid tumultuous scenes in which court room spectators joined in the joy of a family, Alexander Pantage, theatre multi-millionaire, was acquitted today of charges of a criminal attack upon Eunice Pringle, 19 year old dancer.

The verdict of the jury, after nearly 65 hours of deliberation, came two years after Pantage had been convicted at the original trial and was granted a second trial by the state supreme court. The jurors, joining in an opinion of disbelief of Miss Pringle's story, said they had arrived at the verdict last night but decided to "sleep on it."

Addresses And Church Services

Beloved Pastor

On Sunday, immediately following High Mass in the beautiful church of St. Simon and Juda, Tignish, the parishioners showed their appreciation of their Pastor for the past eight years, Rev. G. J. MacLellan, D. D., by reading him addresses in English and French and presenting him with a well filled purse. The addresses, composed by two of the leading parishioners of the French and English races, were composition gems. They were both written on a large parchment sheet, in script print surrounded by a border of wheat and grapes-the Eucharistic symbol of the Church-in the centre of which was a hand-painting of Tignish church, all of which was the artistic work of Miss Alma Buote, formerly of Tignish and now of New York.

The English address, read by Mr. C. P. McCarthy, B. A., was couched in terms of affection for the reverend Pastor, expressing the regret of the parishioners at the change being made, and wishing him success in his new parish.

This was followed by one in the beautiful French language, read by Mr. J. J. Arenault, which told of their love and devotion for Father MacLellan and expressed the hope that his future would be bright and glorious.

The presentation of a beautiful morocco purse inscribed with letters of gold and well filled with bank notes was made by Mr. J. A. Brennan.

The Reverend Doctor was taken completely by surprise, but with words of deep feeling expressed his thanks to the parishioners of Tignish for their many kind words and good wishes expressed in such appropriate language in both addresses. He considered that his vows of obedience taken at his ordination was paramount to anything else, and he was in this instance obeying the order of his superior. He hoped that his parishioners here would carry on the good work and said that he would never forget the eight years of happiness, peace and tranquility that he had spent in Tignish.

On account of it being the first Sunday of Advent, the choir was not played, but the full organ under the masterful direction of J. J. Chaisson rendered the first Advent Mass and the solos thereto were sung with impressive effect by Messrs Adrien Richard and Henry Gallant. Quite a number were present from Palmer Road, Aliberton and Summerside. The large church was filled to capacity.

Is Optimistic Of Fur Market

Mr. J. Sterns, Manager of the Paris Fur Auction Co., known as the Societe du Marche Francais, arrived in Summerside on Friday evening direct from Paris. He will leave on Monday for other fur centres. Interviewed by a Guardian representative on Saturday Mr. Sterns gave a very optimistic opinion of the fur situation in Europe. Mr. Sterns is not here to buy furs but to look over the prospects for the coming sales and especially to see officials of the Canadian National Fox Breeders Association.

His chief advice to fur ranchers is to market their pelts early. The furs that he has seen so far are in very good condition considering there has been no winter. The Paris Fur Auction Co., intend holding two sales this winter. At these sales they hope to obtain about the same price as last year.

Paris is in a better position to handle the fur market this year as her currency is stable and there is no unemployment.

Mr. Sterns says that the Canadian built up a wonderful industry in the Silver Fox business but they lack methods of distributing the pelts. To market the pelts so that they will bring good prices they must not be dumped on the market all at one time nor in one place. Cooperation, not only between the ranchers and the local distributors but between the buyers and the firms that make up the finished article is necessary if the industry is to be a success.

Canada still holds her own as producing the finest and best furs. Norway is increasing her fur farms, but although she is nearer the market her skins are coarser and not sought by buyers generally.

Mr. Sterns stressed the importance of better distribution, more cooperation and the creation of demand. When that is properly understood the silver fox industry will be one of Canada's greatest wealth producers. The use of fox where-

At the eleven o'clock service yesterday Canon Malone read the Pastoral letter of His Grace Archbishop Worrell, Primate of all Canada, dealing with the work done at the recent meeting of the General Synod. At Evensong, Canon Malone delivered a stirring Advent message and urged all to make St. Andrew's Day and the second of December days of prayer. During the service the Advent hymn No. 69 was sung as a prayer.

Today is the Festival of St. Andrew and there will be a celebration of the Holy Communion at 7.45 a. m. and a chain of prayer throughout the day in the Cathedral for the spread of the missionary work of the Church. Wednesday is a day set apart for prayer by the General Anglican Synod of Canada for the arousing of the world to a true conception of the being of God as He has been revealed to us in the life of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, and in that conception find the true mainspring for the purity and uprightness of life, which alone can place the nations on a plane of happiness and prosperity.

The Synod calls upon its people to study anew with reverence and prayer the majesty, holiness, and love of God and to pledge themselves to bear witness of this faith by accepting the obligation and joy of the high standard of Christ's life and service. In the Cathedral the following services will therefore be held on Wednesday, 7.45 a. m., Holy Communion; 12 o'clock noon, Litany; 5 p. m., Evensong and at 7.30 p. m., a short service of intercession. On Thursday, the fancy sale and tea will be held in the Cathedral Hall. The incumbent has just received notice of the following bequest:

The following has been received from Messrs. Ravenscroft, Woodward & Co., acting for the executors of the late Mrs. Louisa Frances Kate Thiele. Mrs. Thiele was formerly Miss Dickson and resided in Charlottetown with her brother who was a Lieutenant on the "Gulnare" a survey ship.

By her will she bequeathed to the Rector and Churchwardens of St. Peter's Anglican Cathedral and his or their "successors," one hundred pounds and all her jewellery, including the gold chain with cross and coin attached, belonging to her late husband, to be by them applied as follows:

The gold and silver of the said jewellery to be melted down and therefrom and with the one hundred pounds an ornament or ornaments or vessel or vessels made, with a suitable inscription, to be set with the jewels taken from my jewellery, such vessel or ornament to be used in the service of the Church of St. Peter, and the Testatrix desired that the jewels should if possible be set clear so that their beauty can be seen.

The Testatrix also bequeathed to the Rector and Churchwardens the further sum of Fifty pounds to be invested by them and out of the income from such investment to pay for the insurance against all risks that might happen to the said ornament or vessels in perpetuity.

Smuggled Aliens Into United States

NEW YORK, N. Y., Nov. 28.-A huge conspiracy, which resulted in a steady, illicit parade of aliens from Canada and other countries into the United States, was believed by federal officials to have been smashed with return of 31 indictments today against 17 lawyers, consular employees, members of the immigration and naturalization forces.

Medials refused to estimate how many aliens had been smuggled into the country by the alleged conspiring of the 17 men, but 60 aliens were among the indicted group.
