Seeks To Limit Presidential Power

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—Senator Lodge (R-Mass) prepared today a resolution to limit Presidential discretion under the United States Neutrality Act. He said the present law "tended to get us into war instead of keeping us out of it."

Instead of permitting the President to decide alone whether to invoke the act, the resolution would require him to report to Congress whenever he had reason to believe there was a state of war, or civil strife, threatening the peace of the United States.

If Congress concurred in his views, the President would be required to proclaim the existence of a state of war, naming belligerent states.

Then, any United States ship-owners who transported cargoes to belligerent state would do so at their own risk.

crimials." Authorities said the charges probably would be raised to "conspiracy against the internal security of the state."

The extent of the organization, formally known as "Les Comites Secrets D'Action Revolutionnaire (the secret committee for revolutionary action)" is believed of such political importance the Senate may reserve final decision itself, by constitutional right.

FLAYS DICTATORSHIP

LYON, France, Nov. 25.—(CP-Hava)—Rejecting an offer of his social party followers to make him their president for life, Colonel Francois de La Rocque today assailed all forms of dictatorship and violence.

Addressing a national congress of the Social Party, which succeeded the outlawed Fascist-inclined Croix de Feu League, Colonel de la Rocque declared that acceptance of the lifetime leadership would give his enemies an excuse for attacking him as a would-be dictator.

"Some day I want to have the joy of being in the ranks among you," he said. "I do not wish anyone to attribute to us intentions which we do not possess. We are a party in the true and good sense of the word 'democratic,' which means that we are opposed to a dictatorship because it is contrary to the French spirit."

missioners were to bring overseas buyers and the Canadian sellers together. Every four years they were taken back to Canada for a tour to "re-Canadianize", to be put in direct touch with conditions and learn how they might best serve agriculture and industry overseas. During the tour they also endeavored to give a better idea of his potential market to the Canadian producer.

Canned Chicken

This Province could develop a good trade with the United Kingdom in canned chicken, the Commissioner believed. There would not be a huge market for the product, however, because it was a luxury food to many overseas consumers. If Prince Edward Island could produce white fish meal at competitive prices a good market could be found in the Old Country, the speaker continued. Considerable quantities were being imported into England at present.

A Market For Strawberries

There should be little difficulty in selling large quantities of Prince Edward Island strawberries in the United Kingdom, Mr. English went on to say. A large volume was imported annually, principally from Holland and were subject to duty while Canadian berries entered free. Price and quantity imported were of course governed by the crop in England and on the continent. The Commissioner did not believe that this province should be content to send only experimental shipments of berries. A determined attempt should be made to market large quantities.

Oysters from this Province would be difficult to market in England. The market there favored a much smaller oyster than is grown here. Attempts to find a market in the United Kingdom for Canadian potatoes at the present time was a "dead issue," Mr. English said. It could be revived at some future time, he thought.

Mr. English is a native of Alberta. He has been Trade Commissioner in London for five years. Previous to that he was stationed in Ireland. This is his first visit to this Province. He was well acquainted with one Prince Edward Islander in London, he remarked, in the person of Mr. A. T. Seaman, assistant Canadian Exhibition Commissioner in London. An advertising campaign, including a travelling exhibit, featuring food products, had done much to increase the demand for Canadian goods.

The Commissioners were most interested in fostering the food products trade because they believed the prosperity of this country depended on the prosperity of agriculture, Mr. English said.

Rev. Dr. Legate, Branch Chaplain, Gives Interesting Address.

For the first time the new Dominion wide ceremony of admittance was used, which added much to the initiation of the new members.

A resolution of thanks was adopted thanking Mr. Alnsworth and the Maritime Electric Company for their thoughtfulness in flood lighting the Great War memorial.

The Rev. Dr. Legate, Branch Chaplain, on being called upon gave most delightful and instructive lecture on Scotland's great memorial to her war dead, which stands on the highest spot on Castle Rock in Edinburgh. The lecture traced the history of the great memorial from the time its erection was first conceived in 1916 until its completion in 1927. The lecture will be remembered by all those who had the privilege of hearing it. The lecture was illustrated by lantern slides which showed both the outside and interior of the memorial. The lantern was operated by Mr. Hurst. At the close of the lecture a standing vote of thanks was tendered to Dr. Legate and to Mr. Hurst.

After the singing of the National Anthem, refreshments were served and a most enjoyable hour spent.

LONDON PAYS TRIBUTE TO STATESMAN

Capital Receives Ramsay MacDonald For Last Time—Funeral At Abbey Today.

LONDON, Nov. 25.—(CP Cable)—Fog-shrouded London tonight re-echoed Ramsay MacDonald for the last time.

The political warrior who had entered the capital often during his lifetime in moods of both triumph and despair, came back this time in a coffin surrounded by reverent mourners.

Crowds stood in silent tribute to the dusk outside Paddington Station as the body was removed to the MacDonald home near Hampstead Heath where breezes off the heights often reminded the sturdy Scot of his own storm-swept Moray Firth.

The fog provided a shroud over the city, seemingly fitting to the occasion as the statesman's family and intimate friends mourned their loss at home.

Tomorrow the body will be taken to Westminster Abbey where at a public funeral service at noon the nation will bid farewell to the man who thrice was Prime Minister—head of two Labor cabinets and creator of the National Government.

The Archbishop of Canterbury will officiate at the service. The Duke of Gloucester will represent the King. All members of the Government, from which Mr. MacDonald resigned last May to seek rest after a strenuous public life, were expected to attend.

After the Abbey service the body will be cremated and the ashes taken to his native Lissmouth where the family service will be held Saturday.

The ashes will then be buried in Spynie churchyard, two miles from Lissmouth, in the place where he often said he would like to rest. Ramsay MacDonald died at sea Nov. 9, while en route to South America for his health.

Is Appointed To Command In Egypt

LONDON, Nov. 25.—(CP Cable)—Lieut.-General Sir Robert Finlayson, colonel-commandant of the Royal Artillery, has been appointed General Officer Commanding British troops in Egypt, the War Office announced today.

Sir Robert will succeed Lieut.-General Sir George Weir in the appointment which is effective April 12.

A Major at the outbreak of the Great War, Sir Robert rose rapidly to a Colonelcy, winning the D.S.O. and being mentioned in dispatches eight times.

After the war he served in North Russia and was aide de camp to King George V from 1929 to 1930. In recent years he held important posts at the War Office and the Staff College.

dling a gun, and it's no fun to be around an amateur when he starts handling a gun."

While one of the robbers covered the trainmen, his companion started back through the train and began taking money and valuables from the 150 passengers on board.

As the train neared Hachita, N. M., near the Mexican border, the brakeman was commanded to signal the train to stop.

Then, as the youths attempted to leave the front coach, Smith grappled with Lorenz. As Dwyer raced up the aisle to his aid, Sam Webb, 65-year-old negro mechanic of El Paso, stuck out his foot and brought Dwyer smashing to the floor, his head striking a seat.

K. C. Moon, a switchman, joined Smith in an attack on Lorenz, and passengers swarmed into the fray.

In the melee Lorenz' gun went off and Smith fell, mortally wounded. He died as the train was entering Arizona.

Another bullet tore through Webb's jacket, and one smashed a watch being carried by Jose A. Rodriguez, 55, also of El Paso. The watch was stopped at 12:42 o'clock and its presence probably saved Rodriguez' life.

"The bullet thudded against my hip and I thought I was gone," said Rodriguez.

Both gunmen were beaten into submission and tied to seats until Hachita was reached, where they were turned over to Sheriff Franney.

LITTLE THEATRE GUILD OPENS THIRD SEASON

Large And Appreciative Audience At Season's First Studio Night.

The third season of the Little Theatre Guild opened auspiciously last night with the presentation of three one-act plays, providing a variety of dramatic entertainment which was applauded warmly by the large audience present.

As on previous occasions, the Little Theatre Orchestra conducted by Mr. Harry Gomez, gave a splendid musical programme.
