AMERICANS TO LOOK AFTER CUBA

AIR IS FREE IN WAR OR PEACE

It was decided that the air is free in time of war and peace and that the only control states have over air traffic is entirely upon the necessity of security of the state.

SWINDLING GAME AT TORONTO

Union Trust Alleged to Have Lost \$55,000, in Timber Limits.

Stevenson, supreme councillor of the I. O. G. T., before the Insurance Commission.
