

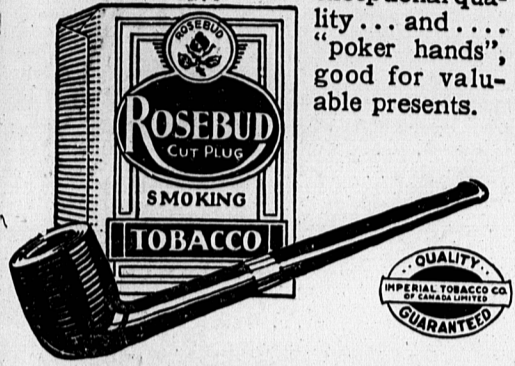

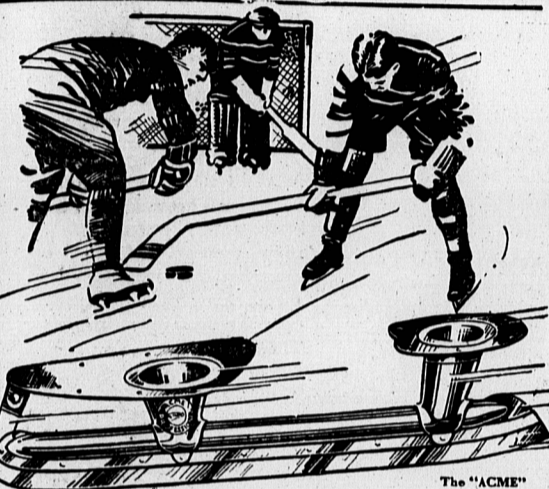

—QUICK ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE—Prohibition Magistrate Tweedy held his usual weekly court in Summerside on Saturday at two p. m. Three Summerside parties charged with the illegal consumption of liquor, were fined \$15 and costs or 20 days; \$15 and costs or 15 days; and \$30 and costs or 30 days respectively. A Kensington party was fined \$20 or 20 days for a similar offence. An adjourned case, a party from Lot 11 charged with having liquor illegally in his possession, was fined \$200 and costs or three months in jail. Shortly after three o'clock the Court adjourned and Chief Inspector Haywood, accompanied by excise officers Platts and Mann made a raid on the "speakeasy" on Central Street. After digging away a pile of coal on the concrete floor they found a removable slag, which gave access to the cache, where two gallons of rum were found very cleverly concealed. The young man in charge was arrested and at once taken up to the Court House, where Magistrate Tweedy reopened the Court and immediately proceeded to try the case. The young man pleaded guilty and was fined \$300 or five months in jail under the Prohibition Act and \$200 or six months under the Customs Act. Only half an hour elapsed between the time the raid was made and the Court adjourned until Saturday next.

**LIONS ON THE RAMPAGE**

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, Nov. 23.—(By The Canadian Press)—It has been reported from Mafeking that lions have been roaming around West Ranch and a number of farms in the Sitagoli district have been visited by them. They have been devouring livestock on the farms and at least one native boy has fallen a victim to the lions.

Two native boys happened to be on the veldt in a very bushy part between Saltpan and Grootswain when they suddenly came upon a lion. The animal bounded towards them. The elder of the two boys succeeded in climbing a tree in time to save himself, but the other was unable to do so and was immediately attacked by the lion, which feasted upon the unfortunate youth. It was some considerable time before the elder boy could leave his place of concealment and give information.

**BAPTIST CHURCH**

Very large congregations were in attendance morning and evening at the Baptist Church yesterday. Sermons of outstanding eloquence and power were preached by the minister, Dr. A. C. Vincent. **TRINITY UNITED CHURCH**

Rev. J. R. Saint, D. D., of Kensington preached very acceptably at both services yesterday in support of the maintenance and Missionary fund of the United Church of Canada. Trinity Church here is probably the largest and most important church east of Montreal. The amount expected of the church is in excess of previous years so that the Missionary Committee are much concerned about raising the full quota by 31st December next. Dr. Ayers presented a statement up to the present time. Mr. E. T. Higgs, treasurer of the church also presented facts in reference to the local budget. The official board has approved of the plan for an "Every Member" canvass. A strong committee of 70 laymen and women has been appointed and the work was started yesterday by the distribution of pledge cards and a goodly number were at once filled out and returned.

All the church activities are now in full working order. The attendance at Sunday School is normal 439 present yesterday. The junior congregation has a regular attendance each Sunday of between 75 and 100. In the evening Dr. Saint spoke from the text Matt. 13-38 "The Good Seed Are the Children of the Kingdom" and in a splendid and appropriate address he set forth the power of the individual seed and the power of the individual life.

contractors, it is necessary to tear down the fine old wooden building now occupying the site, as its removal would take about two weeks. Work men, therefore, will today begin demolishing the building.

A steam shovel, operated on caterpillar wheels, together with five motor trucks to haul the excavated material, will be in operation and are expected to arrive tonight.

Approximately 7,000 cubic yards of material will require to be excavated. The foundation work will call for about 700 cubic yards of reinforced concrete, all the work and material being of first class quality. It will be necessary to excavate to the depth of 16 feet for the boiler room of the new hotel, the depth in the other parts being ten feet. The 16 feet excavation will probably mean digging through some hard rock.

Despite the fact that winter has practically arrived the contractors are confident that they can complete the enormous amount of foundation work required within the specified time.

Mr. Allen, head of the contracting firm, formerly belonged to Summerside and is a nephew of Captain Sheppard Allen of that town. He left the province as a youth sixteen years ago and has been very successful in the construction business. Recently his firm finished an important job for the Harbor Commission at Halifax, involving the construction of a marginal road of concrete and scoria blocks, the job being finished one month ahead of the specified time. Mr. Allen will remain in constant touch with the work in Charlottetown.

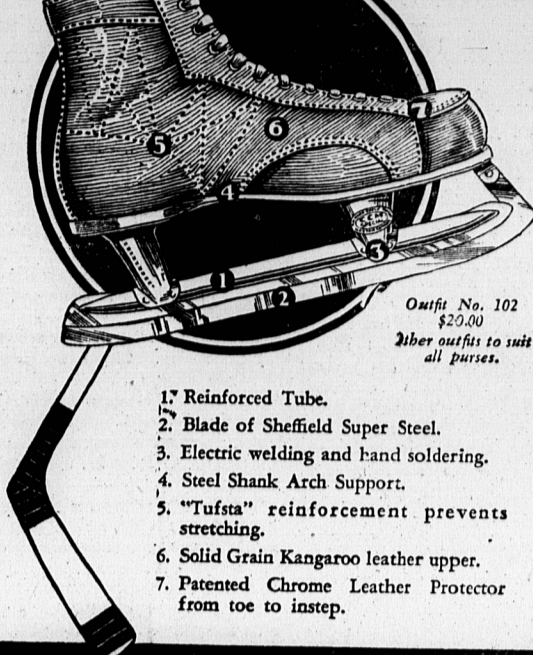

and with a maximum draft of 19 feet 3 inches, under full load. It will be equipped with eight boilers, developing 8,000 h. p. with three triple expansion engines, two operating the two stern propellers and the other the bow propeller, this latter being necessary to meet ice conditions.

In order to facilitate operations through the ice, the sides of the ship will be curved. The present ferry steamer has straight sides, which somewhat hamper the handling of the ship in the ice.

The new vessel will be of steel throughout with three tracks on the car deck with a capacity of sixteen freight cars or eight passenger cars. The upper deck will accommodate forty automobiles. There will be ample passenger accommodation, saloon, ladies' retiring room, smoking room, restaurant, news stand and an observation sun parlor. For operating purposes the vessel will be equipped with radio telephones. The new ferry will be twenty four feet longer than the ferry at present in service and will have a capacity greater by six modern freight cars. Its engines will have one thousand horse power greater capacity.

Work on the dredging and widening of the approaches of the piers for the enlargement of the two terminals, is now under way. Contract was awarded to the Northern Construction Co., Ltd., and J. W. Stewart, of Montreal. The improvements, which include the building of a rampart, will make it possible for motorists to drive up to the vessel and run their cars on board instead of as at the present time, having the automobiles carried on flat cars on the car deck.

vanced yesterday by Dr. A. J. Amyot, Deputy Minister of National Health, deplored the lack of accommodation in Canada for the treatment of drug addicts. It suggested the provincial governments amend their hospital acts in such a way as to make provision for the care and treatment of drug addicts in such institutions. Another resolution endorsed the suggestion that with respect to the treatment of sick mariners, the Federal Government should impose a tax on vessels sufficient to defray hospital, medical and nursing costs. The tax should be made adequate to enable the fund to remunerate doctors to a degree, at least equivalent to the scale of charges required by the Workmen's Compensation Act in the various provinces, concerned.
