MARKET REVIEW

TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 22.—The market was quite irregular with a tendency to softness today. Trading was considerably reduced in volume and it was difficult to gather from the trend of events what the next turn may be. The leaders gave ground. Nickel broke from \$32.75 down \$1.00, but recovered slightly at the close. Noranda was off 75 cents to \$36.25, but recovered 25 cents at the close.

Imperial and Int. Pete. opened off slightly and held firmly while B. A. O. opened at \$42.00 and sold off 55 cents. Sherritt Gordon was not favorably received and stock sold back to \$3.65 from \$4.00, closing at \$3.85. As a consequence the other Lindsay stocks were off. Sudbury Basin to \$4.60, Ventures to \$3.75 and Falconbridge 70 cents to \$6.50.

In the Gold Stocks Lake Shore was very strong getting up to \$20.00, and Wright Hargreaves made a new high of \$1.33, while Teck Hughes sold at \$5.15, McIntyre was slightly lower at \$14.00 and Hollinger unchanged at \$3.10.

The Western Oils gave a little ground, 5 and 10 cents being the average, although some of these came back slightly at close. There were two sales on Home, 200 shares at \$12.10. Mayland was off to \$2.97, Southwest Pete to \$2.05 and others correspondingly. Ajax came under pressure and sold down to \$1.95, closing at \$2.02, a loss of 13 cents on the day.

No decision has been made as regard to hours of trading for next week on Canadian Exchanges. New York announced that it will hold five hour sessions on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, and closed all day Thursday, Friday and Saturday next.

LA TRANCHE Q. Where does La Tranche appear in Upper Canadian history? A. The La Tranche River figures frequently in the early annals of Upper Canada, now Ontario, during the regime of Lieutenant Governor Simcoe when he was dividing upon a site for the provincial capital. For a time he favored one on the banks of the La Tranche, now the Thames River and reported many factors in its favor. This would have made London the capital instead of Toronto, but later investigations led to his choice of Toronto, or York as it was known for a time. Kingston was also suggested as a site as was Niagara where the provincial capital was set up for a few years and where the first Legislative Assembly met.
