Indians, Chisox Close-in On Faltering New Yorkers; Giants Topple Pirates 5-2

IN THIS CORNER

Everything is in readiness for the big boxing match at the Forum Wednesday night when Leo "Irish" Kelly, the most talked-of local boxer at the present time tangles in a 10-round bout with Gordon "Kid" McNeill of Halifax, a real veteran of the squared circle.

Kelly finishes up training today and is in superb condition for the fight while Promoter Joey McDonald who just returned from a trip to Halifax was impressed with the work of the Halifax fighter. "McNeill is in great shape," says Joey, "and Kelly is going to have a tough job on his hands to defeat him."

The fight has caused more interest locally than the occasion of the Lohan-Byans battle last fall. Every eye is wondering just how good Kelly is; whether his showing in the States was just a flash in the pan and whether or not he can take his opponent Wednesday. There is one sure way of finding out and that is by attending. Fans will do just that and it is confidently predicted that attendance records are likely to go by the boards. In addition to the main bout a fast semi-final and three preliminaries round out another well balanced card.

Kelly is drawing so much interest here that the following clipping from Albany, New York, is interesting: "This Irishman looks like the best prospect we've had compete in the Adirondack A.A.U. since we started boxing under an organized head up this way. He moves fast and can punch like a mule."

"He fights 'em all, anybody. He's one of these warriors who thrives on battling and is in there every minute. His fight with Bilecki was out as the best ever seen in Albany and the fans are craving for him again."

The head Max Schmeling a day deal when he deprived him of the title shot he earned against champion Jimmy Braddock but he handed the boxing heads a wallop that carried around the world when he scored "gangster" methods of boxing controllers. Schmeling cut loose with a torrent of criticism which is likely to create a tremendous controversy.

According to an interview from Berlin published by the 12-Uhr Blatt Schmeling criticized the American press which he said was ignoring his "rights." "It is up to the sporting authorities of Europe" he said, "to protect the rights of the sportsman."

That was the end of Schmeling's blast but the Voelkischer Beobachter, Nazi party newspaper, minced no words when it attacked the New York Boxing Commission's suspension of world heavyweight champion James J. Braddock as a "race".

"The sentence is an organized fraud directed against Max Schmeling's rights," it said. "Until now it was not clear whether the boxing commission participated in this manœuvre, but now the evidence is produced."

"Suspension of the 'world champion' has no practical significance as he neither loses his title nor is bound to make good an injustice within the specified time limit. The entire affair smacks of irony."

"The sense of justice of every civilized man will rise up against this comedy. A fair sportsman has been robbed of the fruits of hard-earned victory. The affair throws a strange light on so-called American justice."

The newspaper concludes with the caustic remark: "The U.S.A. has saved the title for an indefinite time."

The Sox peppered this quartet for 16 hits.

Young Jake Wade and hard-hitting Hank Greenberg carried the Tigers to a 4-3 victory over New York Yankees at Detroit in the deciding battle of their three-game series.

The defeat cut the Yanks' American League lead to a game over Cleveland Indians and Chicago White Sox.

Greenberg's 14th home run of the year, which cleared the left field fence and drove in Charley Gehring, who had singled, provided the winning margin in the sixth. Wade, meanwhile, limited the champions to four hits, and struck out nine.

Oral Hildebrand's six-hit pitching for the Browns at home was marred by eight bases on balls but the lean right hander was effective in the pinches and St. Louis defeated Boston 9-6. Three of the Red Sox who walked scored.

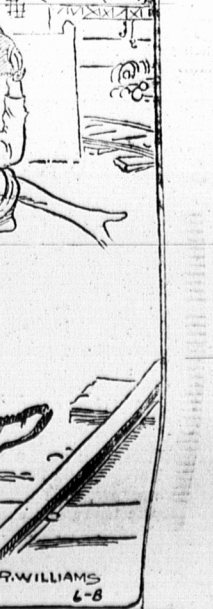
