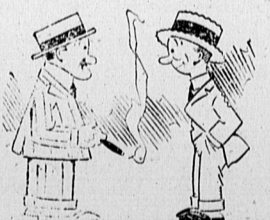

The newly arranged room will have a circular window on either side and, will be closed off from the main building by panels and folding doors. The room will be fully furnished and it is understood, will be provided with a piano and other articles of furniture and equipment. There will be in addition a kitchenette which will give many useful purposes.

This work is being done by Mr and Mrs Frederick J. Lockerby in memory of their son Earle who was killed in action in the late war. Their action on the part of Mr. and Mrs. Lockerby is greatly appreciated by the congregation—all of whom have pleasant recollection of their beloved son and fellow-member of the church. It is a sacred memorial to one whose name has been written on history's page as a true patriot.

The renovation is under the capable management of Mr Charles Ramsay of Summerside and a native of Malpeque. Princetown United is also happy in the gift of another of its benefactors the late Mr. Donald Sinclair, Hamilton, who bequeathed the amount of about six hundred and fifty dollars which has not yet been appropriated. Mr Sinclair was a very highly respected resident of this community, said a member of the church. He was a son of the late Mr and Mrs Arch. Sinclair whose names are still revered here Mr. Sinclair being associated for many years with the session of this church.
