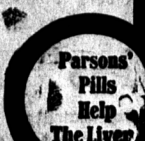

(Canadian Press) SOREL, Oct. 24.—In the Richelieu election Cardin, Liberal was elected by a large majority.

(Canadian Press) CARDIFF, Oct. 24.—The British foreign office has instructed customs officers here to detain Greek ships which have been commanded by the Greek consul.

(Canadian Press) KINGSTON, Oct. 24.—At Kineston ship building Co's drydock this afternoon the new government steamer Dollard was launched and will be used in the lighthouse and buoy service of the St. Lawrence. Miss Hilda Calvin christened the vessel.

(Canadian Press) SOFIA, Oct. 24.—The Turkish garrison of Adrianople suffered heavy losses during the sortie attempted last night from the north-eastern quarter of the town. They left five cannons in the field when they retired. The Bulgarian troops are now only three to five miles from the redoubts and are fortifying their positions.

(Canadian Press) SOREL, Oct. 24.—By-election for the House of Commons to fill the vacancy for the county of Richelieu caused by the unseating of the sitting member for corrupt acts by agents took place today and resulted in the return of P. J. Cardin, Liberal by a majority of 301.

As the constituency went Liberal in the last general election by 734 the result of today's polling was not unexpected.

(Canadian Press) HALLEYBURY, Oct. 24.—The cause of the explosion which wrecked the Energit Powder Works and in which 5 men lost their lives and several were injured yesterday was the dropping of a nail from the ceiling to the cog of the grinding machine, thereby making a spark which flew from the cog to a quantity of chloride of sodium on a tray carried by a boy, setting it on fire. The lad dropped the tray and the flames spread exploding; 5 tons of the material.

(Special to The Guardian) HALIFAX, Oct. 24.—No agreement reported by the jury in the trial of Hubert Grant, who is charged with the murder of Thomas Donaldson. The jury was out about six hours. It is understood the point of disagreement was the question of Grant's sanity and that the jury stood six to six. It is admitted Grant killed Donaldson. The second trial will begin tomorrow.

(Canadian Press) SOFIA, Oct. 24.—Kirk Killiseh fell at eleven o'clock in the morning according to the latest reports received tonight from Bulgarian sources. Turkish troops retired in disorder in the direction of Bunalussar fourteen miles to the southeast leaving the battery of quick firing guns, sixteen ammunition wagons and large quantities of ammunition.

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—A cable despatch from Paris contains the following account of the beginning of the war: When the Sultan of Turkey gave orders for army mobilization he sent to the King of Bulgaria a sack of millet with the following letter: Ferdinand Effendi: Mobilize if you live, but be assured that there are as many soldiers in Turkey as there are grains of millet in this sack. Now, if you wish, declare war!

The king's reply was kind. He sent a very much smaller sack filled with tiny grains of a most virtuous red pepper of the country, with it went the following dedication: Dear Sultan: The Bulgarians are not numerous, it is true, but be assured that to stick your nose into their affairs is like sticking it into our national condiment. Try it and see, they will sting you so sharply that the whole of Asia will not be able to save you!

(Canadian Press) WARSAW, Oct. 24.—Dr. Rann a noted surgeon has been summoned to Spala for consultation over the condition of the Crown Prince Alexis. The Crown Prince is suffering from an injury to the groin and an abscess has formed, which will probably necessitate an operation.

(Canadian Press) SOFIA, Oct. 24.—Kirk Killiseh has been captured by the Bulgarian army which had been fighting against Turkish troops in the vicinity for several days. Possession of the fortress opens the way to the Bulgarian advance on Adrianople.

(Canadian Press) CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 24.—A great battle between the main forces of the Bulgarians and the Turks was resumed this morning along the entire line between Adrianople and Kirk Killiseh. A drenching rain hindered the movement of troops. The Ottoman government has decided to increase the import duty from 11 to 14 percent owing to the requirements of the war.

(Canadian Press) COPENHAGEN, Oct. 23.—Premier Bernstejn today introduced a bill to enfranchise women.

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, Oct. 23.—While descending the stairs of Albany Club yesterday Sir Mackenzie Bowell former Prime Minister of Canada tripped and fell twelve steps to the landing below. The injuries are not of a serious nature.

(Special to The Guardian) HALIFAX, Oct. 23.—Herbert Grant charged with the murder of Thomas Donaldson in Halifax in June is up for trial today before Mr. Justice Ritchie and a jury. Grant pleaded not guilty. The defence did not deny that he shot Donaldson but they are trying to prove him insane. The case will probably go to the jury tomorrow.

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—The late of police Lieut. Chas. Becker on trial for the last two weeks for the murder of gambler Herman Rosenthal will rest with the jury tomorrow.

The counsel for both sides completed today appeals to the jury and all that remained to close the case when adjournment was taken tonight was Justice Goff's charge to the jury which he will deliver tomorrow morning. Becker sat throughout the day with almost immobile countenance.

(Canadian Press) BELGRADE, Oct. 23.—It is officially announced that the third Serbian army today captured the town of Novipazar after fierce fighting and great sacrifice.

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Oct. 23.—The occupation of the Turkish Island of Hemoos by the Greek troops is complete according to advices received by Greek Legation here.

(Canadian Press) HALLEYBURY, Oct. 23.—At noon today the plant of the Energit Explosive Co. was blown up with terrific detonation. The Manager Harry Long, W. H. McLaughlin, a carpenter, Robt. Young formerly of Ottawa, four of mill hands and a woman were killed instantly. Several others were seriously injured. Something is believed to have gone wrong with the electrical machinery which is used in mixing the explosives.

(Canadian Press) WINNIPEG, Oct. 22.—That two weeks will see the wind up of threshing is the opinion of most of the local milling concerns providing the weather is reasonable. 75 percent of threshing is now completed and the yield of wheat, according to threshing, exceeds 18 bushels to the acre both in Saskatchewan and Manitoba and not more than 30 percent of the crop is yet marketed.

(Special to The Guardian) ST. JOHN, Oct. 23.—The Methodist conference Home Mission committee today passed a resolution of appreciation of the work of Rev. Thos. Marshall as Home Mission Superintendent. Mr. Marshall has resigned to again take up active ministerial work as pastor of Grace Church, Charlotte town.

(Canadian Press) WINNIPEG, Oct. 22.—Word was received here from Ottawa today of the appointment of A. C. Galt of Winnipeg and J. P. Curran, of Brandon, to be judges of the King's Bench of Manitoba with residence here.

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—The case of the state against police Lieut. Chas. Becker closed abruptly and dramatically this afternoon with district attorney at the courts commanding reading into record flood of testimony from Becker's star witness Jack Sullivan, King of the Newsboys, testified in direct support of contention of defence that Rosa Webber Vallon and Schepps informers and states witnesses had conspired in jail to send Becker to the electric chair by their own perjury.

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Oct. 23.—That the United Shoe Machinery Co. will abide by the ruling of the Board of Inquiry was the statement made this morning by J. Knowlton, Manager of the Company.

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Oct. 22.—With regard to the report from Ottawa concerning contemplated visit of Lord Roberts to Canada the venerable Field Marshall informs the Canadian Associated Press he has made no arrangements whatever to visit the Dominion.

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Oct. 22.—Greek troops landed today at Katarina on Turkish territory in the Gulf of Salaki and about seventy miles from the fortress according to a news agency despatch from Constantinople.

(Canadian Press) ATHENS, Oct. 22.—After short engagement with the Turkish garrison a landing party of 500 Greeks today occupied the Kastro, the capital of the Island of Lennos and hoisted a Greek flag. Three Turkish officers and fifty-two soldiers were made prisoners, and admiral Countouriotis issued a proclamation to the inhabitants announcing the occupation of the Island by Greece.

(Canadian Press) BERLIN, Oct. 21.—Four candidates were nominated to-day to contest the bye-election in North Waterloo, rendered necessary by the resignation of Dr. Lackner, Conservative. The candidates in the order of nomination are C. H. Mills, Conservative; Allen Huber, Independent; Jas. Tuttle, Suffrage Reform; Matthew Weyman, Socialist.

(Canadian Press) CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—The federal investigation against Jack Johnson moved slowly today, twenty-five subpoenas having been served on the pugilist's associates. The government seeks to show Johnson violated the Mann White Slave act and the saloon closing law.

(Special to The Guardian) TRURO, Oct. 21.—Truro had a \$40,000 fire this evening when the McKay Block in the heart of the town was wiped out. The blaze began with the upsetting of a lamp in the millinery establishment of Madam Lunn.

The flames seemed to break out into the street in a minute, the stone building of the Bank of Nova Scotia on the north stopped the fire in that direction but it extended southward burning out half a dozen firms. After a hard fight the department had the flames under control by ten o'clock.

GENEVA, Oct. 21.—Dr. Wm. R. Brooks, of Hobart College discovered a comet about four o'clock this morning in the eastern sky and the position was right ascension 10 hours 37 minutes 20 seconds, declination south 1 degree 37 minutes. The comet is in constellation Sextans with moderate eastward intrans and visible through small telescopes.

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Oct. 21.—A column of Greek troops was repulsed to-day when they attacked Komidi Pass which was held by Turks, according to a news agency despatch from Constantinople.

General Ivaofis army with Hannah as centre attacked the right wing of the Turkish forces and occupied the village of Kondrale which dominates Mustapha Pasha. The Turks fell back. (Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Oct. 20.—The Ottawa fourteen defeated the Hamilton Tigers in the interprovincial football match today 12-7. (Canadian Press) VIENNA, Oct. 20.—According to late advices from Podgoritz it is learned that Turkish irregulars while proceeding from Plava to Berana to attempt to recapture the city were ambushed by a strong detachment of Montenegrin regulars and routed. (Special to The Guardian) OTTAWA, Oct. 20.—An extra of the Canada Gazette will be issued tomorrow summoning the parliament to meet on November 21st. The date was finally fixed on Saturday.
