vours "controls" to make the bank. However, she has rejected the Western plan for detailed controls and has refused to explain in detail just what she wants. She has insisted on outlawing the bomb first, setting up controls afterward. The United States has insisted on establishing the controls before she agrees to destroy her stock of bombs.

On the basis of Russian statements, Soviet scientists developed an atomic weapon sometime between Oct. 28, 1946 and Nov. 6, 1947.

On the 1946 date Prime Minister Stalin was asked by an American newspaper man (Hugh Ballie of the United Press) if the Soviet Union had its own atomic bomb or any weapon like it. His answer was: "No."

On the 1947 date Molotov said in answer to the same peculiar question "has spread in the United States — "faith in the secret of the atom bomb although this secret has long since ceased to exist."
