Hassett's Homer In 13th Gives Yanks Split With Tigers In Double Bill

NEW YORK, July 12 (AP)—Bunched Saturday for weak hitting, Buddy Hassett returned to action today and blasted a home run that gave New York Yankees an even break in their double-header with Detroit Tigers and added a full game to their American League lead.

Detroit failed to take the first game 6-4, after spotting the Yankees a three-run lead and the nightcap went 13 innings before Hassett drove one of Lefty Hall's new pitchers into the right field stands with a mate on base to give the home club a 3-1 decision.

As Galhouse beat Dick Newsome in the opener, the only run came in the sixth when Don Guttridge doubled, Bobby Doerr last Harvard Cliff's pop fly in the sun. George McQuinn walked, filling the bases, and Guttridge scored on Wally Judnich's ground-out.

At Washington, Cleveland Indians trounced Washington Senators twice, winning the first game by a 10th-inning walk and taking the nightcap behind Jim Bugg's steady eight-hit turn. The scores were 9-7 and 5-0.

Ken Keltner's single, his fourth long triple and Les Fleming's double produced two runs in the 10th to give Cleveland the first game. The Tribe combined the offense of S. Hudson and Alejandro Carrasquel for 17 blows. Carrasquel was the loser.

At Philadelphia, city J.K. Wade led the Athletics to three hits to score an 11-1 victory and give Chicago White Sox an even split in the doubleheader before 17,576. As Wade led the first game 3-2 in 10 innings.

Wade's triumph, his first since joining the White Sox less than five weeks ago, was assured as Jimmy Dykes' crew pounded out 16 hits against four Philadelphia pitchers, while accounting for three.

Roger Wolff, 35-year-old knuckleball hurler, limited Chicago to five hits in the first game to register his ninth decision against eight losses.

Saturday St. Louis Browns decided they had enough for the season long enough for the Yankees, winning 5-2 in the eighth inning. The Browns had lost eight games in a row to Joe McCarthy's stranglehold.

NEW YORK, July 12 (AP)—Pittsburgh Pirates blasted out four runs in the eighth inning today to take the second game of a National League doubleheader from Brooklyn, 6-4, after Larry French had pitched the Dodgers to a 2-1 decision in the opener for his 10th straight victory. The game was played at Pittsburgh.

Kirby Higbe was the loser for the Dodgers in a relief role in the nightcap, with Ken Heintzelman getting credit for the triumph before a crowd of 29,543.

The Buc victory was the first over the Dodgers in seven games. Rookie Ed Head canted along in the nightcap with a 3-0 lead until the Pirates collected two runs on Barrett's triple, Fletcher's single, Elliott's walk and Wassell's

MONTECAL, July 12 (AP)—Brooklyn Dodgers moved Saturday to eliminate their shortage of left-handers by purchasing southpaw Max Macon from their Montreal farm in the International League for an unannounced amount of cash.

Macon, who has won eight games and lost four with Montreal this season, was scheduled to report to Manager Leo Durocher in Pittsburgh today. Before he becomes eligible to pitch for the Dodgers, however, they must release another pitcher since the team is carrying the limit of 25.

It was considered probable that Linwood (St. Louis) Rowe, veteran right-hander who was purchased from Detroit this season, would be sent to Montreal.

The only left hander on the Brooklyn pitching staff is Larry French, who is sporting a record of 10 victories without a defeat.

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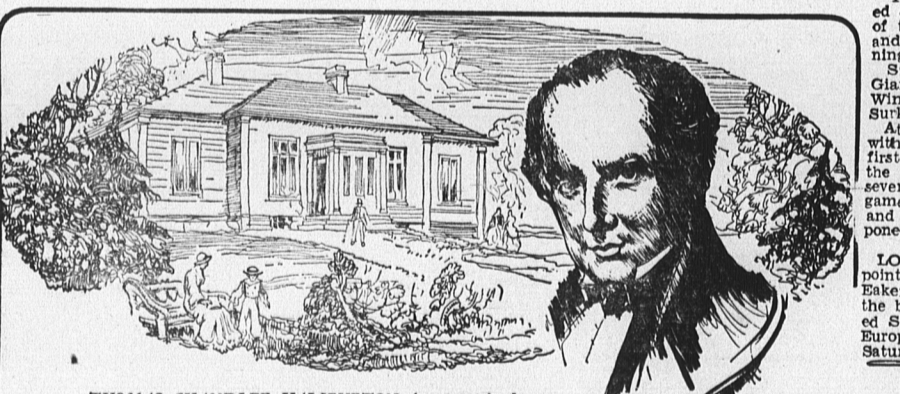
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War—25 Years Ago Today
