Will Speak On Social Problems

Prof. J. King Gordon, travelling secretary of the Fellowship for a Christian Social Order, will speak at two meetings to be held at Heartz Hall, Tuesday, June fifteenth. Tuesday afternoon, at 2:30, Prof. Gordon will lead an informal discussion and at eight o'clock Tuesday evening will address a meeting at which the public is invited. Prof. Gordon is expected to analyse some of the vital issues confronting our present-day society and to discuss Capitalism and its connection with Christianity. Those who attended Prof. Gordon's lecture on Russia two years ago will remember him as an interesting speaker, most effective in the give and take of the discussion period. The son of Ralph Connor, Prof. Gordon is a graduate in Arts of Oxford University. He is also a graduate in theology of the United Church College at Winnipeg and has followed postgraduate work at Union Theological Seminary in New York. Prof. Gordon ministered, as a theological student, in the Home Missions Lumber Camps and after graduation served as minister in a Manitoba industrial town. He was appointed lecturer in Christian Ethics in the Montreal Theological College and served in that position until about three years ago. Since then he has travelled widely in Europe, including two trips to Russia. Prof. Gordon, as travelling secretary of the Fellowship for a Christian Social Order, has gone all over Canada speaking before college groups, service clubs, public meetings, church gatherings and other public groups. He is at present touring the Maritimes. Prof. Gordon is keenly interested in the application of Christianity to economic, industrial and social problems. He is a believer in the possibility of a peaceful transition to a more equitable and fraternal social order through a frank and open discussion of our problems, including points of tension between conflicting groups. He uses the open forum as an effective means to this end. The public is cordially invited to attend Prof. Gordon's lecture. Large Group Baptised By Adventist Church

For the past several months Evangelist H. R. Brennan has been conducting a special series of revival and prophetic Bible lectures. These meetings which have been conducted in the Brighton Club, have been well attended and greatly appreciated by the public. Saturday, June 11, the results of these meetings were made manifest when seventeen individuals were baptised by immersion and taken into fellowship with the Charlottetown Seventh-day Adventist Church. The Seventh-day Adventist denomination is preaching the gospel of Jesus Christ in 578 languages, and in 353 different countries and islands. Members are being added at the rate of 40,000 annually. They have 69 large publishing houses scattered around the world which are printing gospel and health literature in 171 languages. In addition to these, they own and operate 70 colleges and academies, and 2,400 day schools of elementary grades, employing 4,500 teachers. They also have a system of 112 hospitals, sanitariums, and dispensaries, which bring relief to thousands of unfortunate who are unable to pay for medical treatment. From their A-1 medical university at Loma Linda, California, physicians, surgeons, nurses and dieticians are graduated yearly. Many of these go to foreign lands as medical missionaries. Seventh-day Adventists have the largest number of foreign missionaries of any Protestant organization. Since the year 1863 this denomination has given \$223,865,840.28 for gospel work.
