

MAPLES BLANK WILSON GOES CANUCKS 2-0 TO CARDINALS

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 24.—(By the Canadian Press)—Scoring their first victory of the season over the Stanley Cup holders, Toronto Maple Leafs shut out Montreal Canadiens 2 to 0 in a cleanly played National Hockey League game Saturday night.

Only five penalties were meted out in the speedy play which saw Joe Primeau give the Leafs a lead of 65 seconds from the end of the first period. The second period was scoreless. Then, with the Leaf supporters keyed up to a high state of nervous tension as the Canadiens used five forwards in the last three minutes of the game, Frank Finnegan slapped in the second goal with 37 seconds left to play. Programmes littered the ice as the pent up feelings of the crowd were given relief.

Canada's Entries For Olympic Speed Skating

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 23. (By the Canadian Press)—Seven Canadians were selected Saturday afternoon to represent Canada in the Olympic speed skating events at Lake Placid, N. Y., on February 4.

Those entered in the 500, 1500, 5,000 and 10,000 meter events are Frank Stack, Winnipeg; Alex Hurd, Hamilton, Willie Logan, Saint John N. B. The following are entered in single events: Leopold Sylvestre, Montreal, 500 metres; Herbie Flack, Toronto, 1,500 metres; Harry Smythe, Moncton, N. B., 5,000 metres; Marion McCarthy, Edmonton, 10,000 metres.

The selections were made at a meeting of representatives of the Canadian Olympic Committee and the Canadian Skating Association.

MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 24.—(By the Canadian Press)—With a display of tennis better than he has ever given in Montreal, J. Gilbert Hall, veteran South Orange, N. Thus Hall today is the holder of two championships he has held in previous years. In 1929 the New Jerseyan defeated George Lott, whom he beat Friday in the semifinals, to win the singles title. A year later Hall partnered Mercer to capture the doubles crown. Hall succeeded Lott as singles champion and he and Mercer gained the laurels last year by Lott and John Van Ryan, of Philadelphia.

PARIS, Jan. 24.—(Canadian Press Cable)—The Ottawa All-Star touring hockey team today had ended its European tour after defeating Les Etrangers De Paris five goals to one in the final game of its itinerary, played here last night.

MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 24.—(By the Canadian Press)—The Maroons perished provided Montreal Maroons with a 3-3 tie with the Chicago Blackhawks here last night in a National Hockey League match.

The Maroons had the edge on Hawks both in shots of goal and territorial play, but the doughy goal tending of Chuck Gardner left the Montrealers trailing by three goals until the last eight minutes of play, when their luck turned and they ran in three counters and forced the game into overtime.

With the Montrealers intent upon Gardner they frequently left their own defence wide open. Paul Thompson, bought from the Rangers this year, took advantage of such lapses to score two Chicago goals. He rifled the first one into the corner of the net on a pass from Lowrey. In the second period Lola Couture broke away, slipped easily through the Maroon's defence and had Normie Smith at his mercy. Chicago went three goals ahead early in the third period when Paul Thompson caught the Maroon's defence up the ice again, blazed down the right boards and drilled an angle shot into the cage.

Brydson fed Hooley Smith the pass for the first Maroon goal. A little over a minute later Nels Stewart and Babe Siebert worked a double assist that gave Brydson a goal from right on top of the Chicago net. The tying goal came from a blazing drive that Dave Trotter sent high into the net on a pass from Babe Siebert.

The overtime was dull. Sobered by those three quick goals the Hawks were warily on the defensive, and the Maroons were tired out.
