ST. JAMES CHURCH Yesterday was the conclusion of the Rev. Dr. J. Keir Fraser's acting appointment as minister of St. James, and he conducted two very impressive services delivering, as usual, sermons suited to present day needs. His message in the morning was "The Message of the Cross" taking for his text 1 Corinthians, I and 18: "For the preaching of the cross is to them that perish foolishness; but unto us which are saved it is the power of God". In the evening Dr. Fraser's subject was "Fisherman's Expedition", basing his remarks on St. John 21 and 6: "Cast thy nets on the right side and thou shalt find". The soloist was Mrs. Lawson, who sang, "Adore and Be Still" (Gounod). In the course of both services Dr. Fraser thanked the congregation for the universal friendship and goodwill extended to him during his acting appointment. Nothing could have been finer, and on occasions the expressions of appreciation were somewhat embarrassing. He would be pleased at any time in the future to offer his services on their behalf, and meantime he would be looking forward to worshipping with them next winter. At the Kirk Session met informally when the Session Clerk, Mr. D. A. MacKinnon, conveyed to Dr. Fraser their deep appreciation of the manner in which he had discharged his onerous duties, and especially the brilliant discourses which he had invariably delivered. He presented Dr. Fraser with an address accompanied by a suitable gift. "As I stand before you at this hour of worship in this christian church, my mind flashes back to China and I think of Chinese temples by the thousands in every province of China, many of them covered with decades of dust on the enormous pillars and roofs. These temples have stood for hundreds of years as temples of refuge to the Chinese souls in their search for God. Now we find over 90 per cent of these temples being used in part or whole as barracks, factories, markets, money exchange offices, etc."

Rev. Mr. Dickinson, a United Church missionary in west China, has been engaged in that work for the past 25 years. He is a native of England and was educated at Mt. Allison University, Sackville.

Rev. Hugh Miller, pastor of Trinity Church was speaker at the evening service.

The special music at the morning service consisted of a delightful rendition of the "O Love, Thy Peace" from Handel's Oratorio Judas Macabeus, by Miss Ethel Peake and Miss Margaret Coffin of Mt. Allison Conservatory of Music—Mr. Robert Irwin, L. R. A. M., the celebrated Irish Baritone gave a superb interpretation of the Aria "O God Have Mercy" from the Oratorio "St. Paul," by Mendelssohn. Tells Of Great Awakening Of Chinese Nation

Rev. Frank Dickinson, Missionary On Furlough From West China, Is Speaker At Trinity Church.

"China was until recently dazed with the growing power of Japan, and stunned with Japan's aggression in Manchuria, but Christian friends, China has awakened. She has gone and bring it into line with modern ways of life."

During his address Rev. Mr. Dickinson made a plea on behalf of the best thinking Chinese for people in this country to change their attitude and seek to educate others to change their attitude towards the Chinese nation.

"The impact of a conscientious statesman would hesitate to analyze or conjecture China, old traditional civilization is being shaken to its very ancient foundations and China has actually started to go through the most significant changes that the world has ever known," the speaker declared.

"The second thing, I want to emphasize," the speaker continued, "is that the Chinese are now alive to the prevailing evils in their own country and are marshalling their Christian forces to combat them."

The church and her ideals upon the situation has created a conscience in regard to these prevailing evils in the land, and I believe we are fast approaching the time when the Christian leadership of China will be able to assert itself, and be the saving force for Chinese civilization.

"China has surprised the world on several occasions, and she will do it again."

"The third thing, I want to say is that the foundations for Christian Missions must be laid deeper than upon the particular evils found in the Chinese national life. Taken at their best the people of China, the whole social and national life of China need Christ. We cannot go longer to the people of China on the special grounds that they are the neediest-people of the world."

"We have to longer refer to them as heathen—because it bites into their personal and national pride. In their present temper the Chinese are the proudest people in the world, and they have a culture—a love of art, poetry, architecture together with a saturated solution of religions in their life."

"How then are we going to approach the problems of going before the Chinese with a well rounded out missionary message?"

"We have to go to them in the spirit of co-operation offering help and guidance because they are members of the great family of nations."

"We have to go because they are a people with great possibilities. Because they are a people who can give as well as take."

"Because they are a people belonging to the brotherhood of man and while now, they are passing through this period of national anxiety and reconstruction, we should give all the aid we can to help them turn the corner with their
