Three Perish By Explosion

have been blockaded in this port by ice since last Friday, all got away today, the seven steamers pulling out before noon with the Terra Nova, Captain Keen, in the van.

Score on Floes.

In the strenuous efforts that were made to get the vessels through the ice, blockading the mouth of the harbor, the Terra Nova resorted to blasting operations. Blasting powder, hauling ropes and levers were employed. A score of the seafarers wrote on the floes, the majority of them keeping a strain on the ropes and using levers to make a passage for their ship when a powder container prematurely exploded shattering the ice on which the men stood, into fragments, in an instant the sea was strewn with bobbing heads of the sailors who were in imminent danger from the onward rush of their ship from the seaward movement of the ice and from the paralyzing chill of the icy waters on their overheated bodies.

Ropes were thrown to the struggling men and within five minutes all but three had been rescued.

Net Earnings Gain \$17,000,000.

"If that is accomplished, what part has the Canadian National Railways played in that laudable attempt? This year the net earnings of the system were about \$20,000,000 as compared with slightly under \$3,000,000 last year. In the preparation of our budget I was determined that the money which had been earned last year by the national railway system should tangibly reflect itself in a reduction in our demands and financial requirements from the Government, so that this year the national system will support \$20,000,000 less than last year.

"And while our requirements are still considerable, you can at least take some comfort from the fact that this 'pale grey' animal has reduced the color of its hide by that much."


