THE SUPREME STANDARD OF THIS LIFE IS HIGH

and, as a result, fell into disgrace. We might recall today one of the most gifted of men, who lived and died in this country, one to whom logic was second nature and whose soul was a fountain of eloquence. Ah, but to think of the mighty orator is also to remember one who sacrificed principle, compromised his conscience, in order to gain a corruptible crown, the presidency of the United States. Lawful were the means employed to gratify that ambition, and why did he fall? Because for one moment he looked away from his ideals; one moment, but in that instant temptation proved too strong and the great statesman stepped down. Man is never safe when directing his gaze toward any other than the highest ideal. No continent, however prosperous, has within its borders any possession to be compared with the pearl of character. Character is the fabric made by weaving together of the threads of duty, months and years, while the shuttle of life flies back and forth to carry out the design of a heavenly operator. In character as a finished product the sterling qualities of manhood or womanhood are seen to blend beautifully, and all colors mingled together produce the spotless white, so the many parts composing character unite in displaying the immaculate purity found in our greatest ideal—Jesus, Son of God and Servant of men. He is the Supreme Ideal of the world.

But how shall this greatest ideal command the allegiance of your mind? How shall man learn to treasure in his own soul the supreme model? To be so thoroughly interested in the pre-eminent teachings of the world's pre-eminent teacher, as to declare sincerely, "For me to live is Christ!" How indeed?

It were well to ask ourselves that question and to remain unsatisfied until the answer is forthcoming. It is a grand sight to behold one so absorbed in his task that he bends all his energies, in singleness of devotion, to the prosecution of some branch of science, of art. But it is infinitely more inspiring to note the person whose one ambition is to live the Christlike life. That sight is too seldom seen even within the Christian Church. We who are professed Christians look out, with sorrow upon the masses of unconverted people, wishing and longing to see them in the fold of Christian belief; but the fact of the matter is just this: If believers "lived the Christ-life more the world would doubt Him less."

How to keep the Christian's ideal ever in sight, to live it out before the world, is the most burning question of the hour.

The answer to that question may appear from an incident in the life of the great Italian painter, Michael Angelo. It seems that when a mere youth he was called upon to paint a picture described by his father, but the more the student tried the more apparent became his failure. He did not know how to begin rightly. Finally the instructor took a crayon and outlined the scene on canvas for his pupil, just the outline, and then set him again to work. So beautiful were the lines, so suggestive of loveliness, that Angelo seized his brush and soon had filled in the diagram with colors and objects perfectly in accord with his teacher's thought and idea. The illustration is true of a higher order of painting. With masterly hand the Divine Artist, the Heavenly Father and Teacher, has drawn the outlines of the life of everyone here today. He has indicated, by line upon line and precept upon precept, what designs we should work out in the canvas of life. Within reach of each one of us, has He placed the brush of endeavor, the many-tinted colors of time's light and dark and golden days, and has bidden us firmly but tenderly, "Paint it." And as we apply stroke after stroke, as we endeavor to make the picture, when finished, a reproduction of what was His desired plan for us? All depends upon whether you and I are following, oh, so closely, the completed form of that perfect picture framed in the four-sided gospel of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.

That is the only possible avenue to real goodness. Nothing else exerts so salutary, so uplifting an influence upon society, upon the individual, as the transforming power of the spirit of Christ within the hearts of men. Without it the greatest of us is a miserable failure; with it the most insignificant is a success, for true success consists in the inward possession of, and outward devotion to, lofty ideals.

It was the close adherence to that ideal of a kind and patient Paul, and thus converted a destructive force of great magnitude into a constructive force of unspeakable power; it was the relinquishing of that identical ideal that changed an apostle, one of the inner circle of twelve, into a traitor and precipitated the trusted treasurer of the Lord's company into the despicable betrayer of his Master. Loss of Ideals! That explains the gradual disintegrating of empires, and the crumbling away of man's moral and spiritual strength! Fidelity to Ideals! That has been the saving salt to preserve from moral decay whatever is priceless in the world. It has protected the home, upheld the church, defended the state, and made possible in all times and ages a few men and women at least who would not compromise their conscience and bow the knee to Baal.

But how shall this high ideal be attained? By the old law of forsaking the lower for the higher. Easy to talk about, difficult to put into practice. Man is grasping in his nature. Having once secured something which is valuable, he does not realize that there are other things in life of incomparably greater worth which can be laid hold of only by first opening the hand and surrendering those of inferior worth. Take a familiar illustration: The beautiful butterfly flitting over the summer fields with its gorgeous coloring—what was it once? A mean, despicable caterpillar; but it emerged from that state and entered the form of chrysalis, only to abandon that condition for yet a higher one—its very devel-

opment depended upon relinquishing the lower for the higher. And, in the process of spiritual evolution, the identified law obtains: If we would have our souls not dwarfed, cramped and shriveled up by pettiness, meanness and sin, but have them expanded past the larva, beyond the chrysalis, into the fullest maturity of children of the living God, we must be obedient to the laws of religious growth, must surrender the inferior selfishness of our lives, and mount up to the superior stature of unselfishness.

It is said that there is a point on the Himalaya Mountains so far above the grime and soot, smoke and rain and clouds of the surrounding country, that an open book could lie there through the centuries without the smallest particle of dust mar its immaculate whiteness. Would you and I preserve untarnished the fresh new page of life bestowed every morning at break of day? Then we must mount up beyond the malaria and miasma that dwells in the multitudes are gathered at the foot of the mountain, past all mediocre places on the mountain side to the very summit where the character of Jesus Christ shines more resplendently than any glittering dome which caps the highest pinnacle of earth.

Mortality is good, but unless it flowers out into spirituality it is not the best and no man, good and moral though he may be, should be content to remain good when he can become better, or to remain better while there is a "higher up." Whatever things are true, honest, just, pure and lovely—think on these things; but do not forget that such a catalogue includes inevitably the One Person of the centuries who incarnated all those and many other noble qualities, Jesus Christ. Do not forget to "look unto Him" if you would realize the highest manhood in private thinking and public acting.

The ideal is high! But would you be content with a lower? It is attainable, not in your own strength, but through alliance with Him who welcomes back every penitent heart to Himself.
