## George T. Dunlap Wins Amateur Golf Title Of U.S.

### Turns Back Veteran Champion Max R. Marston 6-5 In Dazzling Display Of Golf.

KENWOOD COUNTRY CLUB, Cincinnati, O., Sept. 17.—(A.P.)—The mantle of United States amateur golf today was draped around the slim shoulders of freckled 24-year-old George T. Dunlap, Jr., of New York, the youngest player to capture the championship since Bobby Jones first ascended the throne in 1924.

In a dazzling exhibition of shot making Dunlap turned back the veteran former champion, Max R. Marston, of Philadelphia by the decisive margin of six and five Saturday in a match that had 8,000 spectators wildly cheering the victorious work of the eastern youngster.

### Breaks Course Record

To take the title Ross Somerville of London, Ont., held last year, Dunlap shot the first 18 holes in a 68, breaking the course record and gaining a lead of seven up that ended any doubt about the result. He was nine up at the 22nd hole in the afternoon and not even Marston's gallant rally, during which he shot the last nine holes in 32, three under par, could stem the tide.

Dunlap was three under par in the morning and one under par for the total of 31 holes played. While shooting his plus-perfect 68, the

## TELLIER OUT WITH WINGED WHEELER SQUAD

### Efforts Being Made to Have Life Suspension From Rugby Lifted.

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Sept. 17.—Red Teller, red-headed snap of the Montreal Football Club who was banned for life from rugby two years ago by the Board of Governors of the Canadian Rugby Union, has been out practicing with the Montreal Winged Wheelers, it was stated Saturday by James Riddell, President of the Club.

Unofficial efforts have been made to have the board of governors reopen Teller's case as it is claimed the life suspension is too drastic.

The banning of Teller came as the result of Teller hitting a Carnegie player after the last game of the Dominion finals two years ago. The whistle had blown and the players were walking off the field when the fight occurred with the Regina man falling to the hard ground and cutting open his head.

## SIGNALS WIN MATCH FROM HIGHLANDERS

### Both Teams Deadlocked In Aggregate Making Fourth Match Necessary.

(Canadian Press) SAINT JOHN, N. B., Sept. 17.—The New Brunswick track and field championships held here yesterday turned out to be a local affair with no outside entrants competing, and records were in no danger of toppling.

Kindest competition was seen in the five mile run, pole vault and high jump. Allison Burley, covered the five miles in 29 minutes, 19 seconds. Leaping 10 feet and nine inches, Roy Leonard captured the pole vault and Sanford Henderson won the high jump with five feet six inches.

## ADA MACKENZIE WINS LADIES GOLF TITLE

(Canadian Press) PINE RIDGE GOLF COURSE, Winnipeg, Sept. 17.—Wearing the Canadian women's open golf crown she won by a decisive 8 and 6 victory here over the defending champion, Margery Kirkham of Montreal, Ada Mackenzie, Toronto, ladies golf and tennis club star, tonight stood ready to defend her Canadian closed title over the tricky layout of the St. Charles Country Club course this week. The qualifying round will be played tomorrow.

### Takes Early Lead

Across the road from Elmhurst where she annexed the open title in 1926, Miss Mackenzie jumped into the lead on the eighth green of the 36-hole final yesterday and was never headed thereafter. She carded 14 pars and four birdies with an 82 for the first 18, best score she has posted since she won the qualifying medal last Monday.

While Miss Mackenzie improved her putting and kept up her fine driving and iron shots, Miss Kirkham failed to get results that placed her on the throne last year.

### Soggy Course

After the first turn the Montrealer returned a seven and a pair of sixes and several fives. She lost the last three holes when she got into traps while the challenger was scoring three of her birdies.

Intermittent rain over a soggy course made conditions uncomfortable for players and the small gallery alike and Miss Kirkham had difficulty over the tees. Miss Mackenzie, however, proved steady under the unfavorable conditions, her short game particularly being brilliant at times.

## Gateways Banish Willow Parks 3-2

### Halifax Team Enters Protest After Bitter 11 Inning Struggle.

(Canadian Press) HALIFAX, Sept. 17.—Deprived of their chance to enter the Nova Scotia baseball finals, Halifax Willow Parks tonight planned a protest against their defeat Saturday at the hands of Yarmouth Gateways. Yarmouth gained the right to meet Springhill Fence Busters by beating Parks 3-2 in a hectic tilt that extended into 11 innings, before 1,400 people at Middleton Saturday afternoon.

Parks actually won the series in games but Yarmouth successfully protested against the first victory by Halifax and the Nova Scotia Baseball Association ordered the game replayed.

Now, Halifax are basing a claim of interference in the fourth inning between Grimshaw and Sheenan in a collision on second and third bases, as their right for protest. They also object to a fast-pitched strike on which Grimshaw was called out in the 10th frame.

Details of the protest had not reached the Association officials late tonight.

## EQUIPOISE LOSES TO SINGING WOOL

### Winner Of Seven Straight Victories Loses Turf's Richest Classic.

(Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—(A.P.)—The great Equipoise today had bowed his head in defeat for the first time this year and another thoroughbred, Mrs. John Hay Whitney's Singing Wood, yet to win the public's support, had arisen to claim two-year-old honors.

On the turf's richest programme, at Belmont Park Saturday Equipoise, winner of seven straight races and quoted at the prohibitive odds of 2 to 5, trailed two others home in the \$5,000 Jockey club gold cup, while Singing Wood, held at 12 to 1, whipped 15 high class juveniles in the 44th running of the futurity to earn a purse of \$81,700.

### 15,000 Fans

The crowd of 15,000 fans sat as if stumped at the end of each race—the two miles of the gold cup and the 6 1/2 furlongs down the widened straightaway of the futurity. They had thought Equipoise unbeatable and placed little financial support on the chances of Singing Wood to win the world's richest race.

The track was muddy from steady rains of the two previous days but "Ekky" was rated the master of all thoroughbreds on either a heavy or dry track.

## United States Stars Shatter Canadian Marks

### Broad And High Jump Marks Bettered In Hamilton Olympic Club's Annual Track Meet.

HAMILTON, Sept. 17.—Two new Canadian track and field records were on the rolls tonight, chalked up to the credit of colored Jesse Owens, sensational Cleveland school-boy, and John Gordon, 19-year-old Detroit High School student. Owens raised the Canadian standard in the running broad jump to 24 feet 7 3/4 inches and Gordon jumped 6 feet 4 1/2 inches bettering the high-jump mark of Collingwood's Jack Portland by 3-8 inches.

Owens sailed to his broad-jump mark after racing to a narrow victory over Bert Pearson, Canadian sprint king, in a 9-10 second final of the 100 yards and accepting a two-yard defeat from the Blonde Canadian filer in the 2.20.

In its eighth annual track and field meet Saturday, Hamilton Olympic Club divided highest laurels with invaders bearing United States colors.

Owens, U. S. National Junior Sprint Champion, trailed Pearson for 80 yards in the century, only to come from behind and nose out the Hamilton flash right at the tape. In the furlong, Pearson went out on top at the outset and won by a margin of three yards in the good time of 22 1/10. Owens was trailed closely in this event by Earl Deacon, of the Hamilton Club.

### TWO GAMES A PIECE

## ST. STEPHEN KIWANIS WIN N.B. TITLE

### St. Peters Lose Third Straight Game to Last Year's Maritime Champions.

(Canadian Press) SAINT JOHN, N. B., Sept. 17.—St. Stephen Kiwanis, Maritime champions last year, won the 1933 New Brunswick senior amateur baseball championship by defeating St. Peter's, Saint John, 4 to 2 here yesterday. St. Stephen took the title in three straight wins, defeating St. Peter's earlier last week at St. Stephen by 10 to 3 and 11 to 3.

Bunched hits in the fourth and sixth innings spoiled a fine pitching performance by Cecil Brownell, outpaw star for St. Peter's. St. Stephen collected three runs on five of the 10 hits Brownell allowed. As a result, the border team will meet the winner of the Springhill-Yarmouth series in the Maritime play-downs.

### Had Poor Support

Brownell registered strike-outs and permitted only two earned runs. Continued inferiority on the part of his outfield, as in the previous two games, was a factor in Saint John's defeat.

The all-around playing of George Purcell, Kiwanis second baseman, was outstanding. He collected a single and double out of four times at bat, drove in two runs, and executed the most spectacular defense play of the series with a running one-hand catch at short right center. Later he made a brilliant stop of a ground ball, robbing Nickerson of a base hit.

### Seeking Third Title

Seeking their third consecutive title the champions gave "Howdie" Clark brilliant and errorless support.

The St. Stephen pitcher yielded only eight hits, including two by Brownell. St. Peter's scored their first two runs on the only occasions they were able to bunt their hits. Brownell's two bagger in the fifth drove in the first tally, and three consecutive singles in the seventh accounted for the other.

St. Stephen chalked up their final run in the seventh by means of Godfrey's two-base smash, an infield out, and a squeeze play with their moundman at bat.

## FAMOUS BOXING REFEREE PASSES

### Louis F. Magnolia Succumbs to Throat Ailment Saturday.

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—(A.P.)—Louis F. Magnolia, referee in some of the boxing ring's most famous matches, was dead tonight, from a throat ailment. He was 54 years old when the end came in a Queens Hospital Saturday.

It was Magnolia—a prize fighter in his youth—who raised the arm of Jack Sharkey in victory in the Boston sailors' fight with Young Stribling in Miami in February, 1929. Magnolia was the sole arbiter in the fight.

A year later, also at Miami, Magnolia disqualified Phil Scott in the third round of the British heavyweight fight with Sharkey—bringing loud protest from British fight fans and newspapers.
