INSURANCE RATES MAY DECREASE

As a Result of Improvement in Fire Service

The Proposed Scheme is Likely to Mean the Removal of Twenty-five Per Cent Lately Added.

It is understood as, in part, the result of the recent visit of C. E. L. Jarvis, Fire Insurance Adjustor, St. John to this City that proposals will be made by the Board of Fire Underwriters to the Mayor and City Council for a reduction of insurance rates which the merchants claim have recently become so exorbitant.

It will be remembered that last July an increase of twenty-five per cent was made in the rates and another twenty-five per cent increase therein in January next should certain improvements in the fire system not be made in the meantime.

Since then the Fire Board has made more efficient the fire apparatus and a second main pipe, asked for by the underwriters is in course of construction. The Fire Underwriters have now offered to take off the addition made in July and waive the increase in January in view of the improvements and also the appointment of an electric inspector which they also asked for some time ago. Their request for an up-to-date fire alarm system they have decided not to press for.

The only remaining difficulty is to whether the electric inspector, if one should be appointed his power under the present act to enter houses, etc. in the performance of his duties, etc. This was apparently the only difficulty some time ago when the question was discussed. It is probable that the whole question will come up for discussion at the meeting of the City Council next Monday night.

ELECTRIC ROAD TO THE YUKON

Mr. Lacombe Prefers it to Steam—Territory Loss.

MONTREAL, Oct. 30.—"I think our alleged loss is mostly sentimental and as far as I can see the Americans have too many troubles of their own in that country to attempt to make too many for us." The above statement was made by Dr. George A. Lacombe, M. L. A., for St. Mary's and French Secretary of the Trans-Canada Commission who has just returned from the Yukon.

He says that over 100 witnesses were examined, although the testimony was very conflicting, he believes that the Government will be able to get sufficient information out of the report to enable them to reach a proper appreciation of the Yukon situation.
