ATHENS, Jan. 28.—(Wednesday) —(AP)—Greek mountain troops shattered two fresh Italian counter-attacks north of Klisura yesterday and inflicted "heavy losses" on the Fascists, a Greek government spokesman said early today.

Murder case Opens in the Supreme Court

Seven witnesses gave evidence in the case of the King vs. Jeremiah Doucette of Charlottetown, charged with murder, when the case opened yesterday in the Supreme Court with Mr. Justice A. C. Saunders presiding. Cross examination of the seventh had not started when Court adjourned at 5:20 p.m. to resume at 10:30 this morning.

The prisoner is charged that on or about the 14th day of July 1940, Jeremiah Doucette did unlawfully kill and murder Jeremiah Doucette. Supplies "leak" Into Germany;

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—(AP)—The possibility arose tonight that United States trade with Soviet Russia might be curtailed further after British officials asserted that important military supplies were "leaking" into Germany through Russian purchases of cotton in the United States, which amounted to approximately 140,000 bales during the last three months of 1940.

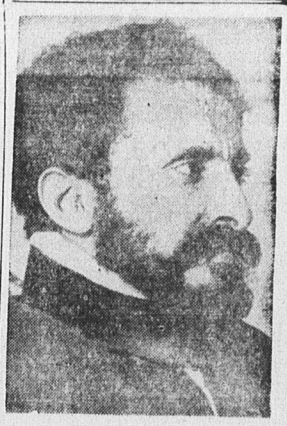

Nazi raiders return to attack after four-day quiet; Long range shelling across Dover Strait.

VICHY, France, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Admiral Winter, United States ambassador to France, said in a statement today that "it is my personal opinion that the British government can and will prosecute the present war to a successful conclusion."
