PORT OF SPAIN REVIVES PLANS FOR HARBOR

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, Aug. 24.—After lying dormant two years, plans have been revived for a deep water harbor at Port of Spain to cost £1,000,000 sterling. The plans were revived by the government's application for a loan from the colonial development fund it was indicated in a statement at Westminster by Sir Hilary Cunliffe-Lister, British secretary for the colonies.

Revival In Can. Lumber Industry

MONTREAL, Aug. 24.—Increased purchase of Canadian lumber by United Kingdom markets and prospects of increased sales in the United States, where a "wave of economic optimism consequent on President Franklin D. Roosevelt's National Recovery Act" is said to have resulted in a building boom, are listed as "signs of unmistakable revival in the Canadian lumber industry," in a report drawn up by the Montreal Board of Trade.

WANT TEACHERS SALARIES ADVANCED

LONDON, England, Aug. 24.—(C. P.)—Urging that the time is overdue for the removal of the ten percent cut in men teachers' salaries, which was imposed in October, 1931, the Executive of the National Association of Schoolmasters has written to the Prime Minister, J. Ramsay MacDonald. It points out that the cut was for "the duration of the crisis" and that Stanley Baldwin, Lord President of the council, recently said that all danger of financial collapse in this country has disappeared.

In Restigouche, at Falls Brook and Robinson's Brook, crews were still on and the fires were under subjection this afternoon.

The Green Point, Restigouche County, blaze was also under control. Northumberland County, where the situation is the most critical, saw fresh fires today. The Allanville area blaze sprang up again today burning crown land. A crew was at work tonight. Fifty acres of land were burned between Young's Settlement and Pleasant Ridge. It is now out or at least under control. The Shaddock Lake blaze is patrolled by 12 men, and is under control. At East Collett, flames burst out anew and burned down both sides of the Bay Du Vin River and threatened the little village of St. Margaret.

Swine

The number of animals entered in the Swine Class was somewhat smaller than former years due to the fact that Falconwood Farm did not exhibit this year. With the usual number of entries from Falconwood, there would have been a larger class this year than last. The opinion of the judge, Mr. James Graham, Moncton, was that the average quality was much superior to that of past shows. Judging was an extremely trying task. Breeding classes were outstanding and Messrs Ernest Houston, New Glasgow, Percy Dickieson, New Glasgow, and Frank MacAulay, Souris, dominated the show. Individual entries worthy of special mention were the Grand Championship sow owned by Mr. Percy Dickieson, the Junior Championship boar owned by Mr. William Jenkins, Dumfriesfringe and the first prize sow and litter owned by Mr. Frank MacAulay. In the market classes Messrs Houston and MacAulay gave the judges a very difficult task in placing some well-fitted exhibits.
