(Continued from page 1) confiscating rifles and ammunition.

Almost immediately after their arrival from India yesterday, the Royal Scots Greys, one of the last remaining horse regiments in the British army, was called to help in the fight near Mount Carmel.

The Greys formed part of 2,400 troops arriving on three troopships as the advance guard of reinforcements sent to try restoring peace to the troubled Holy Land.

At Lydda, Palestine's main rail junction, 21 Arab homes were destroyed by British troops because of recent attacks on military police.

Biggest in 16 Years

Forestry department records tonight showed that not since 1922 has the timber country suffered such an attack. Sixteen years ago in Northern Ontario flames roared over Hollybury, Fort Lake and Carleton, claiming 75 miles and leaving 8,000 homes, with property damage estimated at \$5,000,000.

Over the same area in 1916 fire raged for 1,200 miles, killing 250 persons and five years before that 90 persons died in the Cochrane area and \$3,000,000 damage was inflicted.

Estimate of the damage wrought yesterday and today could not be reached. Homes and outbuildings are charred ruins. Livestock, piles of pulpwood and cordwood were destroyed.

Warm weather and lack of rain since early September presented the flames with tinder dry material two weeks ago. Since then the fire was through brush and grass, until yesterday when a south wind whipped the flames throughout the Rainy River section.

PRIME MINISTER EXTENDS SYMPATHY

NEW YORK, Oct. 11—Prime Minister Mackenzie King tonight expressed "deepest sympathy" with the relatives and friends of those who lost their lives in the fires sweeping the timberlands of northwestern Ontario.

The Prime Minister was preparing to sail on a West Indies cruise when informed by The Canadian Press that at least 14 persons had met death in the fires north-west of Fort Frances.

He was deeply shocked and asked that his sympathy be extended to those who have sustained the most lamentable and irreparable loss.

MINNEAPOLIS, Oct. 11—(CP)—Joseph Dardis, 67, of International Falls, Minn., died of a heart attack today while aiding in the rescue work necessitated by forest fires in northern Minnesota.

A Park Rapids, Minn., civilian conservation corps youth was killed in the crash of two forestry service fire trucks and a fire fighter suffocated near International Falls.

Correspondence Shows Major Hahn Treated As Canadian Government Representative. (CP By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Oct. 11—Inquiries from the National Defence Department to the External Affairs Department for information on the British Government's intentions regarding purchase of Bren guns in Canada were not forwarded to England, Mr. Justice H. H. Davis, Royal Commissioner investigating the Bren gun contract was told today. These inquiries took the form of suggested cables to Canada House, the High Commissioner's office in London, and passed between the two departments during the winter of 1937. In April of that year, Major General A. A. LeFleche, Deputy Minister of National Defence, was informed by Dr. O. D. Skelton, Under-Secretary of State for External Affairs, of the purchase of Bren guns. Mr. LeFleche stated that it was not thought advisable at present to request the government of the United Kingdom to place orders for munition orders of this type.

On Stand All Day General LaFleche was on the witness stand all day as scores of letters and messages passing between the two departments, between Ottawa and London and between the Department and Major James E. Hahn, President of the John Inglis Company were filed. Some of them were discussed in consequence of consent received over the weekend from the British Government which had previously objected to a cable being sent to its affairs being made public. All formed part of the negotiations leading up to the John Inglis Company's purchase of Bren contracts to supply the Canadian Government with 7,000 Bren light machine guns and the British Government with 5,000, with 5,000 of the Canadian contract by Lieutenant Colonel George D. Martineau in a magazine article led to the inquiry which today entered its third week. The correspondence covered the period following Major Hahn's return from England in December, 1936, after obtaining information on the methods and costs of making Bren guns. At the end of the year, General LaFleche said he had become convinced it would be impossible to obtain Canadian requirements of the gun from England within a reasonable period and he was anxious to get a Canadian source of supply started. It was stated that the British Government had been asked for an additional source of supply and if an order from the British Government could be obtained for the Canadian contract, the Canadian Government would be less. For this reason, he said he asked External Affairs Department to assist in the purchase of the British Government. On Dec. 28, 1936, he wrote to Dr. Skelton, asking that a cable inquiry be sent. On Jan. 1, 1937, he asked Dr. Skelton to try to get a reply from the War Office to the previous message. At the same time he said he would like to see the cables sent to England. If he could help matters along. On March 23, General LaFleche advised Dr. Skelton that Major Hahn proposed to go to London on private business and would like to make further inquiries about the Bren gun. FLAMES (Continued from page 1) to the spot where their cabin homes once stood and succeeded in getting Frank's children to safety but Maxine was badly burned she died at Fort Frances. Main district of the conflagration was in Dance township, 50 miles north of Fort Frances, where the Labels were home-staying and where weary officers and fire crews reached tonight for another family reported isolated.

Residents Ordered Out of Area Police and forestry department officials ordered all residents out of the fire area and sent additional crews into the fighting lines which extended westward from Fort Frances to a point near Rainy River. A strong south wind continued to hinder the struggle but last night's heavy rains retarded the flames to some extent. The rains checked the advance of the fire on Rainy River where residents today said they were unable to see the flames before the time advanced to within half a mile of the town. The fire also roared through the forest land to within a mile of Fort Frances. Police officers and firefighters were sent from Port Arthur, Dryden Kenora and Sioux Lookout, Ontario, to assist in the fighting. Charred districts seeking persons unreported. One report said about 30 were yet to be located near Rainy River.
