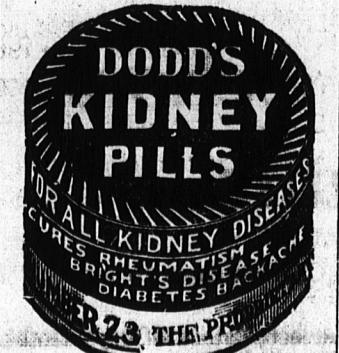
NINTH SESSION.
