AND RECEPTION TO MAJOR P. C. SHERRAN, M.C., AT CRAPAUD

The people of Crapaud are justly proud that this gallant aviator is a native of their village and showed it by the demonstration given him at that place on Wednesday evening. The hall in which the reception was held was extensively decorated for the occasion with flags and bunting the background being of spruce. A burst of applause greeted the Major as he was ushered to the seat of honor which was draped with the Union Jack. He was surrounded by the speakers of the evening; also his father and mother and Pte. W. P. Trows late of Victoria, the adjoining Village who has lately been invalided home. A brief outline of Major Sherran's career will be of interest to Guardian readers. He was born at Crapaud July 26th, 1893 and enlisted with the 9th Battalion (later known as the 26th) in St. John, N. B. in November 1914. He was a member of the staff of the Bank of N. S. at the time and was well-known and highly esteemed in St. John. He is a son of Mr. W. D. Sherran, who has two other sons overseas. Stephen a former student of King's College now an officer of the Royal Flying Corps and George of the 8th Siege Battery who is now in a Convalescent Hospital recovering from recent wounds, which necessitated the amputation of one leg before enlisting he held a position in the bank of Nova Scotia, Charlotte town. When the 26th Battalion was being mobilized the call came to Major Sherran, and he immediately enlisted. Before the Battalion left for England he was however overtaken by Typhoid fever which was so serious that his doctors forbade his going overseas, but he overruled all objections and sailed with his Company while in France with the 26th this being soldier was wounded and sent to England for treatment and was able to rejoin his Company. Later he joined the Royal Flying Corps and qualified. In course of time he became expert in the game and was sent to France. Reliable reports have been received that he brought down as many as five enemy machines in one day single handed, while the whole British Army on that front watched with wonder and surprise his magnificent feats of daring. He seemed to tempt fate and when he went over the German lines, the hottest spot was just the position that suited him. His motto was "The more the merrier" and he always came out of his engagements still in the air. His bravery has attracted much attention from the British Authorities and he was rapidly promoted to his present rank. His medals include the Military Cross. He is one of the men who have made the British Airship Service the best in the world, and is recognized today by the British Empire as one of its most gallant and daring aviators. At the present time he is located at Camp Casside, Toronto, superintending the training of men for the Royal Flying Corps.

IF OPPOSITION WILLING NOT NECESSARY TO AWAIT CERTIFICATES

OTTAWA, March 1.—Wednesday, March 20, is still considered as a most likely date for the assembling of Parliament, more particularly as the present prospects are that the result of the military vote in England will be known before the end of the week. No definite announcement may be made, however, until Sir Robert Borden returns from Washington at the end of the week. The suggestion is made that the late of the opening of Parliament might be advanced by agreement between the Prime Minister and the leader of the Opposition. Under the terms of the Military Voters Act the new members cannot be officially declared elected until the certificates have been received from overseas. The date of the opening of Parliament on the continent must be verified by mail. The point is made, however, that the cables returns could be accepted as official by agreement between the leaders. The provisions of the Military Voters Act regarding mailed certificates would in that event be suspended under the terms of the War Measures Act. If this course were followed the date of the opening probably by a couple of weeks. There is now no doubt but that Speaker Rhodes will be re-elected when the House meets. Should the date be March 20, it is believed that the debate on the address could be disposed of and an interim supply bill be voted before Good Friday, which falls on March 29, when a brief adjournment would be necessary.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations
THE sole head of a family or any male over sixteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within one mile of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
