THE SUPREME COURT.

Pursuant to adjournment the Supreme Court in its Trinity Session was re-opened at the Court House, Charlottetown, yesterday morning, His Lordship Chief Justice Sullivan presiding. As intimated by His Honour Mr. Justice Hazard on the previous occasion of the court's sitting, however, the business on the docket was not taken up yesterday in view of today being Dominion Day. Therefore a holiday, and the adjournment this would necessitate. Accordingly the court resumed only to be immediately adjourned to tomorrow at 11 a. m.

A number of the Petit Jury were in attendance, and at their own request, Albert Gallant of Rustico, and J. T. Cudmore of Winsloe Road, were discharged from further service on the jury at this session of the court.

ROLLED OATS MILL DISCUSSED BY CITY COUNCIL

(Continued from page 5.) much more foundation than they anticipated when they made their estimates, and so he wanted to know if it were possible for the city to help them in any way in that direction.

There was some discussion at this stage as to the probability of the owners of the land over which the railroad would have to pass to connect with Lord's wharf consenting to concede the necessary right of way except at very high rate of compensation. Mr. Hazard stating that that was the difficulty experienced some years ago when a similar question cropped up.

For himself, Mr. Aitken, as one of the land-owners that would thus be involved, made it clear that there would be no hindrance to right of way being obtained across his property.

In reply to Mr. Riley, as to which site he would prefer, Mr. Wheaton said that one was about equal to the other.

But, said Mr. Riley, there is a difference in the matter of price. Mr. Wheaton said that the foundation work would be expensive in both cases. He understood that the Lord property could be got for about \$3,000.

In reply to Councillor Riley, Mr. Vromanhauser said he would prefer the Lord's property.

Mr. Jenkins stated that the presence of the members of the Board of Trade was to show their interest in the matter, which was in good hands, the City Council's.

Mr. Stewart expressed himself as being in sympathy with the movement to encourage the company to locate their business here.

Mr. McCready said he was very glad to find that some persons abroad were interested in establishing an industry in Charlottetown. They were all very desirous of something of that sort being established here. They wanted more industries in the province.

Having got from Mr. Wheaton that besides exemption from taxes, free water and a site, the company would like to get financial assistance from the city in order to meet the extra expenditure necessary for the foundation work, Councillor Riley said that he did not think the Council legally had the authority to vote any such money, and the consensus of opinion among the councillors was that if they gave exemption from taxes and free water and a site they would be doing fairly well and as the raw material of the Island was far ahead of the produce of other places, that should be sufficient inducement to the company to establish their business here.

The Mayor said that there was no difficulty in the giving the company a free site, free taxation and free water. The only difficulty he could see was the financial aspect of the question. The Council would do everything it could as far as it could go to help the company to establish their mill here. But as far as the matter of financial assistance went, that was a question that would have to be put to the citizens.

Councillor Riley suggested that as the establishment of the mill would be of advantage to the whole Island, the company should go to the Government for the financial assistance they desired.

This suggestion met with general approval, and after further discussion it was agreed that Mr. Wheaton and his companions should postpone their departure from Charlottetown until Thursday in order that it should be arranged for them to meet the legislative Council and discuss the matter with them. The meeting is to be arranged for to-morrow.

OF SPECIAL INTEREST

LONDON, June 26 (Special)—A St. Petersburg despatch to the Standard says President Woodrow Wilson has declined Russia's request for a renewal of the treaty of commerce except on the absolute condition that American Jews are allowed to enter Russia freely.

RIO DE JANEIRO, June 26 (Special)—In recognition of the demonstrations showered upon Dr. Lauro Muller in the United States, the Acting Minister of Foreign Affairs, Dr. Regis Olivera, will give a ball on the Fourth of July to the American Ambassador, Mr. Morgan, in the name of the government. The federal Senate also will give a banquet soon to Mr. Morgan.

VIENNA, June 26 (Special)—A second suicide in connection with the Austrian War Department has occurred. Lieutenant Lebel, who had been employed at the War Office, for thirty-five years, after a conference with the head of his department, General von Kiss, returned to his office and shot himself through the heart.

On May 26 a tremendous sensation was caused by the suicide of the chief of the general staff of the Eighth Army Corps, Colonel Alfred Redl. He was stationed at Prague, but was in Vienna on personal business. It was later disclosed that Colonel Redl had been betraying Austrian military secrets to the Russian government.

No cause has yet been assigned for the suicide of Lieutenant Lebel.

BERLIN, June 27 (Special)—President Wilson has been violently attacked in an editorial in the evening edition of the National Zeitung.
