Conservative Leader On Militia Affairs
OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—That Canada at the present time was not nearly doing her part to help carry the burden of Empire defence and that the Dominions active force at the moment was actually not sufficient to repel an invasion were among the contentions of Hon. Hugh Guthrie, leader of the Conservative party in Canada speaking at the ninth annual dinner of the Princess Pats Club in the Armouries here Saturday night. Hon. Mr. Guthrie recalled his own military experiences, from a private in the Guelph Artillery to Minister of National Defence for Canada. He traced the growth of the militia from the time of Wolfe and then, plunged into the subject of empire defence. His own view was that Canada should be self governing, but with certain restrictions. "I believe we should leave world politics to the motherland. I believe Great Britain is more powerful today in international affairs than any other nation and has a more powerful voice than has ever been before."

That Car Of Yours

Heart-to-Heart Talks With Automobile Owners and Drivers on Their Cars at the Least Expense.

SILENCE THE SPLASH PAN
In certain of the lower priced cars on the market, the splash pan is connected with the running board with ordinary roofing nails. The board is laminated and when it gets wet a few times, there is a tendency for the nails to pull loose. The pan, separated from the board, will set up an annoying noise. Silencing it is a matter of using longer nails or, better still, screws. The noise is one that sometimes is hard to find.

CARELESSNESS HERE HURTS
Cars are much better than they ever were before, but this does not mean that they never need attention. Repair men report that the owners who several years ago paid regular attention to having the bearings adjusted have taken to ignoring this important car care feature. The slightest knock should be the car owner's clue to action.

SPARE FUSES AVAILABLE
Motor car makers have contributed greatly to the convenience of driving by equipping their products with extra light fuses. In many of the newer cars, these are carried right behind the light switch where they are most easily found. It is well to remember that the rapid charging of a battery induces a high temperature which damages the plates. The battery never should be allowed to get hotter than 100 degrees. Usually, car owners are not adjustable as to current input rate.

GREASE GUN SUGGESTION.
A grease gun can be quite a puzzle to the man who tinkers with his car unless he happens to know when the washer gives way. In greasing a car many snags are encountered, particularly in the case of clogged spring bolts. The motorist has been taught to turn the gun until grease starts to squirt out of the bolt at the far end and he knows from the experience that this spurting is accompanied by a characteristic sputtering sound. Sometimes, however, this sputtering is nothing more nor less than the leakage of grease past the washer of the gun back into the part behind the plunger. When this happens, the gun develops no useful pressure and nothing can be done until a new washer is installed. If the old washer is installed, of course, the gun will be all right for greasing parts that do not require a great deal of pressure.

TEST DOORS FOR SQUEAKS
When one of the car doors is suspected of squeaking, a quick way to determine its guilt is to drive with it slightly opened. If the noise disappears, the door is the culprit. A little oil on the hinges and vaseline on the lock will remedy the trouble. Both parts are all too seldom lubricated, but the owner who remembers them when oiling the car usually is rewarded by silent operation.

WHERE DILUTION BEGINS
The volatility of the gasoline used has a direct bearing on the dilution of crankcase lubricant. The United States Bureau of Standards has found in its fuel research study. Dilution is consistently greater where a heavier or less volatile gasoline is used, the tests reveal.
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British Cruiser At Nicaragua
CORINTO NICARAGUA, Feb. 28.—The British Cruiser Colombo arrived here yesterday. She saluted the Milwaukee, rear Admiral Latimer's flagship. The British charge, Mr. Harold Patterson, who came here from Managua immediately went aboard the Colombo for a conference with Captain A. M. Lecky. The Colombo, which has been sent to Nicaragua for the purpose of serving as a "place of refuge" for British Nationals endangered by the distasteful conditions in Nicaragua, is the first British vessel to visit these waters since 1919.

Twenty Men Die When Str. Founders
LONDON, Feb. 28.—A Greek seaman, who was rescued clinging to a boat and landed at Penzance, Cornwall, reported the foundering of the Greek steamer Stenias, says a Lloyd's despatch from that place, with the loss of twenty men. The seaman described himself as the engineer of the steamer and said the vessel was in collision off Land's End with an unknown craft shortly after midnight Thursday. The ship's boat was launched with 21 of the crew, but all were drowned except the engineer.

HOCKEY
Tuesday evening last a hockey team representing the Summerside branch of the C. Y. M. L. left for Tignish where they had arrangements made for a game with the Tignish team. As they thought of the prospects of a victory in Tignish, the fact that a player being on the Tignish lineup was not mar their hopes somewhat. However they set out determined to give Tignish a demonstration of real fast hockey. About a mile east of St. Louis the train came to a sudden stop and they were obliged to walk into St. Louis and hire teams to drive to Tignish, where they arrived about an hour later than the hour set for the game. They soon donned their uniforms and hurried to the rink amid the shouts of welcome from the five hundred fans who were awaiting one of the fastest games ever played in Tignish. The local team lined up as a fast aggregation and with Mr. John A. Hackett at the whistle the game got away about 9 o'clock.

Abbies-Amherst Game Will Draw Big Attendance
AMHERST, Feb. 28.—Preparations have been completed here for the reception of the Charlottetown Abbeys, champions of the Prince Edward Island, in their final game with Amherst, the title holder of the Central Section. The game will be played on Tuesday night and requests for reservations have come from far and near. In the first of the home-and-home games at Charlottetown on Friday, the two teams played sixty minutes to a 1-1 score. This deadlock is expected to be broken on Tuesday night. A closely contested game has been predicted as both aggregations are well matched in every position.
