Annual Meetings

Report of Annual Meetings of Women's Institutes of Prince Edward Island

Freeland, Lot 11.—This Institute held their Annual Meeting at the home of two of its members, Mrs. Mary Kinsman and Mrs. W. K. Kinsman on March 7th. Twenty-two women were present. The meeting opened with the singing of the national Ode. This Institute was organized in October, 1921 and since that time the Secretary Treasurer reported the total receipts as being \$57.07 and the total expenditures \$4.05. The balance is to be used for school improvement work. A wire fence and gates are to be placed around the school grounds and a pump installed in this school house. The officers who were elected at the organization meeting were re-elected for the ensuing year.

Sherbrooke—The annual meeting of this Institute was held at the home of Mrs. Viniha Milligan on the afternoon of March 20th. The report of the President was read and adopted. The Institute was organized in March last with a membership of 16. This has since increased to 33. A committee has visited the school from time to time and the following articles have been supplied by the Institute: a globe, thermometer, waste paper basket, towels, etc. to value of \$26. Three times the school has been thoroughly cleaned by members. The children were treated at both half-yearly examinations. A bale of goods was sent to Mr. Herbert Orphanage, consisting of 28 articles. These were all donated by the members. No funds from the club being used for the purpose. Total receipts for year \$182.99. Expenditures, \$98.67, \$84.32 was paid the Hall Committee and a wreath was bought for the Soldiers' Memorial. The following officers were appointed for the ensuing year:—President, Mrs. N. M. Woodside; Directors, Mrs. Colin McDonald, Mrs. Geo. Pickering; Delegates, Mrs. Geo. Harris, Mrs. N. M. Woodside. Another box is to be sent over to Mr. Herbert Orphanage. This consists of six shirts, 2 pair of overalls, 4 quilts and two new pillows.

Avonlea—The annual meeting of the Cavendish and North Ruston Institute was held at the home of Mrs. L. H. Tomlinson on March 14th. Twenty-four members and nine visitors were present. Roll-call was responded to with "Things Worth Remembering." The Secretary Treasurer reported \$51 as total receipts for the year and \$29.40 as total expenditures. Maps, window shades, drinking utensils have been supplied for the school. Paint has been bought and the schools have been cleaned. The following officers were elected:—President, Mrs. J. H. Tomlinson; Vice-President, Mrs. J. H. Tomlinson; Secretary Treasurer, Miss Nellie McCoubrey; Directors, Mrs. W. and Mrs. Robertson, Mrs. McNeill and Mrs. H. McKenzie.

St. Agatha—This Institute was organized on December 27th. Three regular meetings have been held and great interest is being taken by all. \$8.43 has been raised. Twenty-nine quarts of preserves have been sent to the Prince County Hospital and is pairs of mitts and two pairs of stockings have been sent to the Protestant Orphanage. The March meeting of this club was held at the home of Mrs. P. N. Pate, on March 6. There were seventeen members and one visitor present. The meeting opened with the singing of the national Ode. A paper on Table-setting and Service was read and thoroughly enjoyed by all. It was decided to hold a basket social, proceeds to be used in community work. Three new members were added to the club. The next meeting will be held at the home of Mrs. Geo. Bernard on Monday, April 3rd, at 7.30.

This Institute was organized about eight months ago and since that time the Institute has raised \$65.50 and \$63.16 expended. Alberton Notes

One of the largest funeral processions that has ever been witnessed in this Town, was that which followed the body of Mr. Frank Keefe on Sunday afternoon to the Sacred Heart church, where the last rites were performed by the Rev. Father Campbell, D.D. The cause of the death of Mr. Keefe in St. Agatha, Quebec, last Monday, came as a great shock to the people of Alberton and vicinity, all of whom knew him and respected him for the great intellectual ability and integrity which he displayed while yet a youth. The deceased left here in July, 1921, and went to St. Agatha, Quebec, where, under private treatment, he hoped to recover from the disease from which he was suffering. But, while he made a great and courageous fight against the ravages of tuberculosis, he, in the end had to submit to the will of this foul monster, and on March 23rd, the spirit departed from the poor and tired body. He leaves his mother, four sisters, Mary, Eileen, Catherine and Florence; three brothers, Walter, Gerald and Dr. William Keefe, M.D. All are at home except Dr. Keefe who is practising in North Toronto. The sympathy of the whole community is extended to the grief-stricken family. In this their hour of sorrow.—H.

SIR ROBERT BORDEN DONE WITH POLITICS

TORONTO, March 29—Political and Washington conference subjects were strictly banned in an interview with Sir Robert Borden, ex-Prime Minister of Canada, at the York Club today.

"I don't want to talk about the conference," Sir Robert said. "There will be a report laid on the table of the House soon of all I have to say. I am making a report to the Prime Minister." And as for politics, Sir Robert intimated that he was done with that life for good and all. He stated that he would have nothing more to do actively in political affairs. "I'm through with political life," he declared. Sir Robert said that he was just in the city for the day attending a meeting of the Executive Council of the League of Nations in Canada, to be held here this afternoon. Afterwards he is going to Montreal on the work of the same society. A similar meeting will be held there tomorrow.
