War Crimes Trials Will Be Delayed

PARIS, May 28 — (AP)—Germany's principal war criminals are to be brought to trial for "some time," pending the ironing out of certain details of the international military tribunal which will try the military crimes of Robert H. Jackson, chief United States counsel for war crimes, said today.

Mr. Jackson and his chief assistant, Maj. Gen. William J. Donovan, reached London later in the day to meet with the United Nations War Crimes Commission.

He told correspondents here that the dates of the trials had not been selected, nor the manner of carrying out the death sentences.

PRICE CONTROL TO CONTINUE

WASHINGTON, May 29 — (AP)—Continued price control and rationing until at least July 1, 1946 were recommended today by the Senate Banking Committee.

The committee approved and reported to the Senate a measure extending the life of the Office of Price Administration for another year beyond its scheduled expiration June 30, 1945.

Previously the committee had under consideration an 18-month extension.

Scout News and Notices

Latest census shows that there are 1840 Scouts, 100 Wolf Cubs, and 10 Rover Scouts in Newfoundland.

Ninety Scouts from fourteen Scout Troops in Kitchener and North Waterloo in Ont., recently added 5,000 trees to their Scout forest in Bramosa Township. The Scout Association purchased the land and is reforesting it over a period of years with the co-operation of the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests.

Lord Rowallan, recently appointed Chief Scout of the British Empire and Commonwealth, attended a great rally of Scouts in Belgium on St. George's Day. Despite the fact that Scouting was outlawed by the German occupation authorities, Scout membership grew in leaps and bounds during the occupation. Boy Scouts played an important part in underground activities.

Boy Scouts of Kelowna, B. C., have been responsible for the founding of a Museum in Kelowna. Already over 4,000 articles of historical and other interest have been gathered together. The museum is located in the hayloft of a barn for the time being. The collection includes Indian relics, collections of butterflies, birds' eggs, mounted birds and animals, souvenirs of the present war, cap badges of Canadian regiments and many other items. It is expected that the city will eventually take over the venture.

The Canadian Boy Scout movement is to co-operate in the formation of an Inter-American Committee on Scouting and John A. Stiles, Chief Executive Commissioner for Canada, has been named the Dominion's representative on the Provisional Committee which is scheduled to meet at Caracas, Venezuela, in December. The formation of the new committee, which is to include all South and Central American countries with the United States and Canada is to bring all Scouting methods on this continent into line with the principle laid down by the founder of the movement, Lord Baden-Powell of Gilwell.

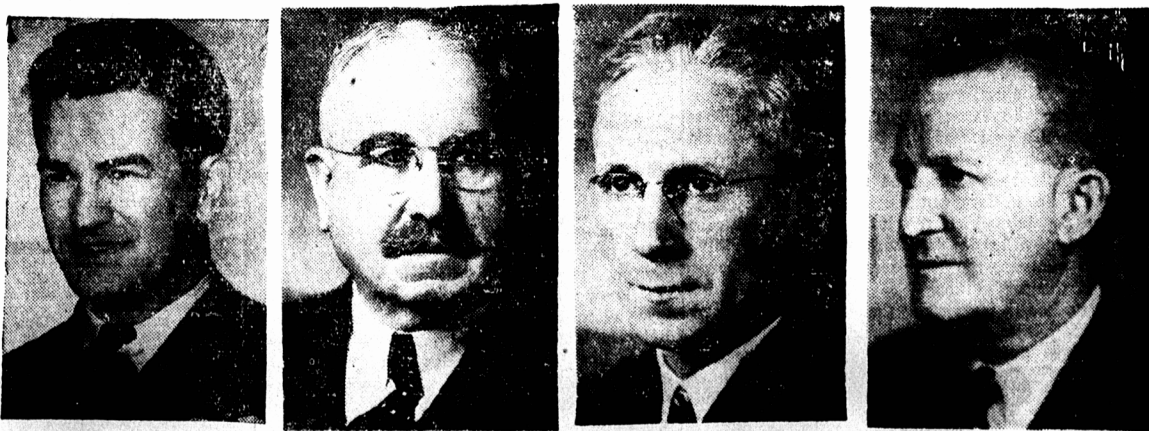
