general run of so-called "complete" fertilizers. "The fact is," according to a University of Illinois bulletin, "that the total amount of commercial potassium applied annually to all the farms of the United States is no more than is contained in one square mile of common cornbelt land to a depth of six feet, and the important potash problem is how to liberate it as needed from the inexhaustible supply already contained in all normal soils."

There are some soils, such as peat or muck, and certain sands, that are without potassium, but such soils have never been expected to do much for the farmer, without special treatment. Investigations have shown that decaying organic matter has power to liberate potassium from the supply contained in the soil, so all that is necessary on the part of the farmer is that he use judgment in selection of his crops and follows rotation, which allows of the return of an abundance of organic matter to the soil.

The crops that are large consumers of potash, such as the legumes, oats, barley, hogs and tobacco must be watched to see that they do not suggest a shortage of potash by means of a lack of color and want of maturity, and if there is a sign of weakness on the part of these crops, steps should be taken to supply potash through plowing in the legumes and the use of farm manures, which, if supplied in sufficient quantities, will supply nitrogen and liberate phosphorus naturally contained in the soil.
