Four Rhodes scholars from the United States and Canada reached Boston yesterday on board the Leyland liner Canadian, which docked at her pier in East Boston shortly before 6 o'clock last evening. Among them was G. C. Hucaby of Bangor, Maine, La., who has been making a study of anthropology for the past three years at Oxford. The other Rhodes scholars were A. B. Meservy of Ashland, N. H.; H. C. Brownell of Burlington, Vt.; and J. Dally of Prince Edward Island, Canada. Mr. Hucaby intends to give his entire attention hereafter to the race question in the South, and for the purpose of carrying on his investigations in this country in a thoroughly scientific manner he will apply to the Carnegie Institute for assistance. Mr. Hucaby's endeavor will be the first organized attempt to give the world the results of the fusion of the white and black people of the South. This subject has been a very delicate one with the people south of Mason and Dixon's line, who have bitterly opposed any fusion of the races since the Civil war, despite the fact that it was common to slavery days. Mr. Hucaby is a typical Southerner in appearance, tall and lanky with black hair and delicate, thin pale features. Having had the broadening effects of study and travel to help him in his opinions on this subject, he believes that the fusion of the white and the black people of the South would not be as desirable as many of his fellow Southerners declare.
