Ukraine Cleared of Red Guard Troops

MOSCOW, May 13—(British Admiralty press wireless press)—The commander-in-chief of the German troops in the east, replying to the Russian request for the cessation of hostilities on the Ukrainian front, says that German troops, in accordance with the terms of the Brest-Litovsk treaty, have cleared the Ukraine of Red Guards and that it should be possible to do so everywhere along the Ukrainian land frontier.

The commander-in-chief said he could only agree to the cessation of naval operations against the Black Sea fleet provided all ships returned to Sebastopol and were retained there. Then the port of Novorossysk would be opened free to navigation. He claimed that the Black Sea fleet more than once had participated in the fighting against German troops in the Ukraine.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Three to six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, or certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may reserve a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties six months residence in each of three years after cutting homestead patent; also 30 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

HAD PREPARED FOR BIG DRIVE

ALTHOUGH an empty shell, is doubtless a prize worth striving for.

The German people are asking for tangible proofs of the successes already alleged in the west. There have been frequent references to Ypres in the letters written by relatives and friends of German soldiers, and the obstinacy of its defenders is commented upon.

Enemy Trenches Water-logged.

It is significant that no frontal attack has been attempted. An enterprise of that nature would involve crossing the canal and assailing the old ramparts. It is much more likely that Ypres will be attacked from the south. The recent rain has softened the ground around Ypres and Kemmel and the trenches dug by the enemy are partially water-logged. In some places it is impossible to excavate more than three feet without striking water. Constant baling is necessary to keep the defences habitable. Craters speedily become muddy pools and cannot be used for shelter. Although the weather has improved greatly, these conditions have not yet been modified by drying sunshine.

Everywhere on both sides of the new No Man's Land that stretches from the old No Man's Land north of Albert into the still green fields east and south-east of Amiens, there is constant and unremitting industry. Men are digging and widening and strengthening defences which a few weeks ago were nothing more than strips of wood-covered trench, country lanes, hedges and shallow holes scooped out by prostrate snipers.

Two other German divisions opposite the French tried to assemble but the French themselves attacked just before that in order to improve their line near La Clytte-Kemmel road, and their supporting barrage appears to have completely dispersed the enemy. Similarly the British artillery plastered the German positions around Voormezele, and the division holding the sector near the canal did not attempt to move.

The German bombardment of the Ridge Wood defences was so intense that the British outpost line in front of them was completely destroyed. When the waves of the 52nd Reserve Division appeared, about half past nine o'clock, the British sharply fell back behind the wood and left these battered remnants to the enemy. The Germans tried hard to establish themselves in the wood. They dug in and brought up machine-guns, and throughout the day continued to push forward into the area of blackened stumps, which is all that remains of the wood itself. West of it the British troops had to fall back aside the Wytschaete road as far as Klein Vierstraat, a distance of perhaps 500 yards. Toward the Ypres Canal however, they did not yield a yard or ground.

Then Came the Seaforths

A British barrage fell on the German machine-gun post at the eastern fringe of the wood, and from the other side came the Seaforths prying their way through the stumps with ominous deliberation their bayonets ready. Some Germans declined to meet them, and disappeared in the barrage. Enough remained, however, to put up a lively little struggle among the ruins of the trenches they had tried to reconstruct.

Before it was quite dark the Seaforths had cleared the wood completely, killed quite a number of the enemy, and had taken some prisoners, including an officer. Middlesex troops were among the other units engaged. Pockets of Germans in open ground west of the Wood were not cleared until yesterday morning.

The enemy did not make another attempt yesterday. Heavy machine-gun fire was laid along the front between Loere and Ridge Wood, and the German artillery indulged in an expensive retaliatory bombardment but the infantry remained quiet.

I think we must expect another effort possibly with additional fresh divisions, in the same region. Ypres.

Canadian Travel Restrictions

On May 8th Mr. Albert Stanley, President of the Board of Trade announced in the British House of Commons the decision of the Government to place great restrictions on travel in London, England, and vicinity, which later will be extended throughout the country. Passenger train service, he said, would be reduced forty per cent, and it will be necessary for everyone to show that his proposed trip has an adequate reason.

The issue of season tickets will be greatly restricted. This will affect a large number of aliens, who have moved to places outside of London, owing to the air raids, and travel back and forth each day.

In Canada the C. P. R. with a view to economizing train service, and thereby assisting in the most vigorous war effort, has been obliged to considerably reduce the number of passenger trains.
