CO-OPERATION DESIRED IN AFFIXING POSTAGE STAMPS TO LETTERS.—It is desired that the public co-operate with the Post Office in affixing postage stamps to mail matter and for this purpose the following suggestions are offered: Always place the stamps in the upper right hand corner of the envelope, well clear of the address, and by the way, the stamp is that if you lick the stamp, in the good old fashioned way, you may in a moment of enthusiasm remove too much of that very necessary mucilage which should keep it in place on your letter. So just place the envelope and press the stamp down firmly upon it—as we said before in the upper right hand corner, making sure before dropping the letter in the street letter box or post office receiver that there is no danger of the stamp coming off while on its way through the mails, for if it does, then although the letter will be sent on to its destination, the person to whom it is addressed may have to "pay up" on account of the missing postage, and may make uncomplimentary remarks accordingly about your carelessness. 15-31

SEATTLE, May 14.—The famous old slipper ship Glory of the Sea, said to be the fastest of her type in the world, was burned on the beach here yesterday, efforts to have her preserved as a historical relic having failed. The ship was built in East Boston in 1889 by Donald McKay, famous builder of sailing ships. She made a voyage from Havre, France around Horn to Frisco in ninety days, a record never surpassed by any vessel of her type. Donald McKay, designer of the Glory and many others that brought renown to American sailing vessels, was born at Jordan River Shelburne County, Nova Scotia September 10th, 1810 and died at Hamilton, Massachusetts just seventy years later.
