PRODUCE

MONTREAL, Jan. 22.—As a result of the mild weather causing increased production which was reflected in heavy receipts, cheese quotations were fractionally higher. Egg receipts for the week totalled 8,038 cases as compared with 8,028 cases the previous week and 8,121 cases the first week in the month. On Saturday arrivals totalled 2,112 cases. Fresh graded extras in cartons or less registered a drop of six cents, finishing the week at 25 cents a dozen. Fresh firsts and pullets were quoted at 22 cents a dozen, off five and four cents respectively. A decline of one to one and a half cents a dozen were made in storage eggs in cartons or less. Extras sold at 21 cents, firsts at 20 cents and seconds at 19 cents a dozen.

Bank Statement

MONTREAL, Jan. 22.—High percentage of cash and readily available assets is shown in the 1932 financial statement of the Bank of Nova Scotia issued today. Current coin, Dominion notes, United States and other foreign currencies and deposit in the central gold reserve total \$25,118,000 which is 14.6 per cent of total liabilities to the public as compared with 11.6 per cent in the previous year. Easily available assets total \$17,775,793 which is 60.45 per cent of liabilities to the public compared with 54.85 per cent in 1931. Dividends to the amount of \$1,800,000 were paid. The undivided profits were increased from \$559,533 to \$578,224. The report which is the 101st in the bank's history, showed total deposits of \$295,129,775, a relatively small reduction from the previous year. Deposits not bearing interest are down by \$7,000,000 while interest bearing deposits have increased \$5,368,860. Call loans in Canada and abroad total \$15,245,031 as compared with \$14,984,983. Current loans at \$96,222,801 show a reduction of almost 11 per cent.

heavily but they have increased enough to make Great Britain the chief market of this Dominion. It is a reversed situation. Prior to 1932 the United States was Canada's chief market. Canada's domestic exports to the United States in 1932 totalled \$162,630,799, or \$15,540,901 less than to the United Kingdom. In 1931 the domestic exports to the United States amounted to \$256,942,045, or \$85,407,223 more than to Great Britain and in 1930 the amount was \$395,728,375 or \$160,514,416 more than to Great Britain.

Truck, Bus Questionnaire. Administrative Co-operation. The report was: "Preliminary examination of these questions indicated that considerable opportunity for administrative co-operation existed, particularly in the field of income taxes and transfer taxes on the sale of securities."

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among the greatest number of unemployed. "G—Single, homeless, unemployed. It is recommended that single men 'unemployed and destitute' be regarded as coming within the category of 'single, homeless, unemployed' under the agreements entered into between certain of the provinces and the Dominion.

Unemployed youths: The committee recommends that the Dominion director of unemployment relief take up with the administrative officers in the provinces the peculiar problem of the youth, out of school or college, who finds himself without work and without support, with a view to suggesting means of dealing more satisfactorily with this question."

Dealing with the question of regulation of truck and motor bus service with interprovincial and national transportation facilities, the resolution reads:

Truck, Bus Questionnaire. 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MEMORIAL TABLET IS PRESENTED

A tablet in memory of the late Mr. Percy Pope was presented at the morning service of St. Paul's Church yesterday. It was erected by Mrs. Sheehan, daughter of the late Mr. Pope, and was presented for dedication by Mr. George DeBlois. The dedicatory prayer was offered by Rev. H. D. Raymond.

Following was the address by Mr. DeBlois:

Mr. Rector, Church Wardens, and Vestry of Saint Paul's Church: On behalf of the Donor, Mrs. Sheehan, I ask you to accept and hold in safekeeping this beautiful Tablet erected to the glory of God and in loving memory of her father, the late Mr. Percy Pope. (The inscription on the Tablet reads:—

In Loving Memory of Percy Pope 1856-1930 Who served for many years as Church Warden and Vestryman of this Parish.

"Until the day break and the shadows flee away." Having been associated with Mr. Pope for many years as a Fellow Church Warden, I deem it a great honour and privilege to join with you this morning in honouring his memory and in paying a humble tribute to one who we all learned to love and to admire and who gave cheerfully and generously of his means, his time and his talents in furthering the work and the interests of this Parish and the Church at large.

In looking over the last of the men and women actively associated with the work of this Church in days gone by, and who have since passed on to the Great Church Invisible, I recall many whose names are worthy of being inscribed on the Honour Roll for faithful and loyal services rendered to Church and State, and as we look back and remember the life of Mr. Pope, his devotion to duty, his high regard for integrity and his great desire and willingness to help his fellow-men and the Community as a whole, I am sure that there is no name more worthy of being engraved on that Honour Roll in letters of Gold than the name of our dear friend, Percy Pope.

Through his scholarship his kind and warm heart Mr. Pope enjoyed the confidence and the affection of all our people, wherever he went he did his best to uphold the spirit of bitterness, of selfishness and of greed, and to implant the Christian principles of love, kindness and usefulness. He was indeed a true Christian Gentleman, and in saying that, I pay him the highest tribute it is possible to pay any man, for my friends, there is no finer or higher type of a citizen to be found anywhere than the man who is a true sincere Christian Gentleman.

We rejoice in the hope—and in the assurance—that his life of usefulness continues on beyond the grave.

The late beloved Canon Troop whose memory we all cherish and who was also a friend of Mr. Pope was very fond of quoting these lines, which I pass on to you:— Life goes not out, but on; Thy day has come, not gone; Thy sun is risen, not set; Thy life is now beyond the reach of death or change. Not ended—but begun, O Noble Soul! O Gentle Heart!
