New Presbyterian Church Arranged

MONTREAL, April 19.—The continuing Presbyterians of Rosemount will have a new church, it was announced at a meeting of the Montreal Presbytery. This is made possible by the donations of Mrs. George Kidd, of Westmount, who is giving six lots of Rosemount Boulevard, valued at \$6,000 as well as \$5,000 in cash. Mr. James Kidd, who is also giving \$5,000.

The matter has been referred to the finance committee of the presbytery, and it is thought that a \$35,000 church will be erected. It will be made possible by putting a mortgage on the church for the balance, for which the Montreal Presbytery will be responsible.

There are no conditions attached to the offers of land and money except that the church shall be called the "Kidd Memorial Church" and that proper arrangement for its financing after completion be arranged.

The continuing Presbyterians of Rosemount have been without a church for some time and have been worshipping in a former Anglican Church there.

The request of the congregations of Cote des Neiges and Mount Royal Vale that they be permitted to amalgamate and become a joint pastoral charge was granted. The united congregations have unanimously chosen Rev. John J. Mondas, D. A., of Petrolia, Ont., as their new pastor. The call has been received by the Montreal Presbytery and has been forwarded to Rev. Mr. Mondas.
