The adjourned meeting of the Women's Auxiliary for Prince Edward Island was held in St. Paul's Hall yesterday morning at 10 o'clock. The president, Mrs. Simpson, in the chair. After routine business, an address was presented Mrs. Watson wife of the Arch-Deacon of P. E. Island, who is leaving this province next week. Addresses were delivered by the Rev. Mr. Colclough, the Rev. J. Bamford and Mrs. Watson. The proceedings ended with intercessory prayer. The delegates were entertained at lunch by the St. Paul's and St. Peter's Branches.

LECTURE.— The people of Springfield enjoyed a treat on February 28, when the Venerable Archdeacon Watson, under the auspices of the Red Cross Society of that place, delivered a very interesting and instructive lecture on "The War." For over an hour and a half the speaker in his clear and fluent manner, held the audience in rapt attention, while he took them back in mind to the pre-war years; when Germany, in Germany's way, forced herself upon nations who were not powerful enough to reject her influence and might, and gave the series of events which led up to the outbreak of hostilities in 1914.
