The perennial Sarah, who comes to us for another farewell tour, was greeted noisily and fervently. Most of the noise was furnished by a company of about forty militant suffragettes. Mme Bernhardt was more than surprised when the suffragettes swarmed upon her and almost knocked her off her feet.

As La Provence docked, Mme. Bernhardt retired to her suite on the promenade deck and made ready to be received. Her manager, William F. Connor, and a few old personal friends were allowed to board the ship. Mr. Connor was the first to greet Mme Bernhardt. She kissed him once, twice, three times and then some. 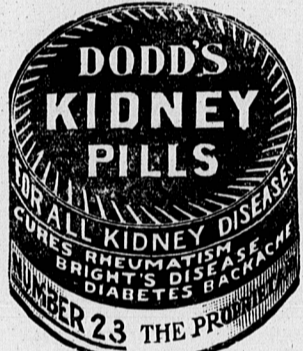

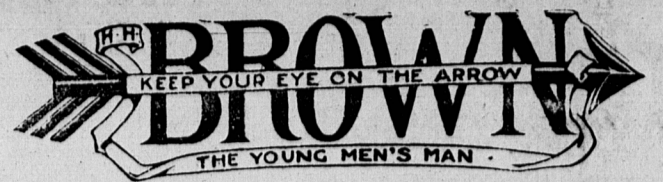
