## COMING TO THE ISLE OF THE GULF

The Discomforts of the Way of Travel Tersely Described—A Number of Annoyances That Have Been too Long Overlooked—How Tourists Feel About it.

Sir.—There is an impression abroad that Americans come to the Island to look at the Cameron Block. That's sheer nonsense. Most of them would have to hunt in their own towns to find anything poorer. They come to live in the country, to enjoy its grassy lanes, its streams, and woods, and sea-sides, its fresh fish and pure meats, and its unsophisticated men and women. The city has a few things, the market (not the market-house), the bust on the Connelly building, the rollicking crowds of boys and girls on the streets in the evenings, the park and its prospect, marred though they are by the hot, dusty, treeless approach. But men won't go far for the like of that. They won't go far miles for the best of the Island can offer, if the travelling is bad. And it is bad.

Prince Edward Island will never appear to the profitable class of American tourists so long as it is reached with so much clog and effort. The pullman leaving Boston is filled to the roof before it is let go. A second car is not put on if it can be avoided. Not long since one was refused although nine berths and the drawing room were sold in advance. A pullman car with uppers and lowers all taken and baggage piled knee high in the aisles is not tempting to a nervous, over-worked man who has been forced by the rascally summer climate of New England to turn northwards for health or recreation. Ten to one he goes no farther than the pullman ticket office. Other routes, however, are likewise overcrowded, and he may persevere. After a smothering night he is turned out early in the morning to take a hurried breakfast, and gets a meal good for a healthy man, but not much for a fastidious Bostonian. An hour and a half in a rattle is routed out again—this time for good, and has to scurry round the turbulent depot at St. John to find the Pullman of the I. C. R. train. There are no "red caps" to carry his hand baggage and that of his family if he "hangs expense in travelling and takes his wife a long." In the same way he has to turn porter at Painesco, at Point du Chene, at Summerside and finally at Charlottetown. But that is not the worst. The I. C. R. train out of St. John has no dinner, unless he takes his lunch, with the smell of the McAdam breakfast still in his nostrils, he can get nothing to eat between eight in the morning and six at night. The water-trip is charming, except in rough weather, but the tourist is fortunate if he does not have to stroll the deck for several hours before the steamer starts. At Summerside he is aggravated by a tedious delay, the train is shunted back and forth, crowds enter and leave the cars; there is a scramble for seats in what seems to the exhausted New Englander to be very inferior, badly-lighted, second-class coaches. Then comes the trip to Charlottetown—the limit of discomfort, as any candid man must admit. The stops seem endless; the train

remains longer at some unknown siding than the Boston and Maine does at Port land; men get off to chat with friends on the platform; the doors are left open and the foul smoke of soft coal fills the car, if the passengers happen to close them, the breakman who goes bawling through the compartment makes good the omission. When to all this is added the ordeal of a custom's examination, the reason becomes apparent why a Boston man, with money to spend and a lively curiosity about the cool, green Island away off in the Gulf, wishes he had never heard of it, and tells his friends to avoid it like righteous living.
