and a successful farmer will not leave home. I know a young boy between 17 and 18 who lives not two miles from here, his father has no land but a neighbor gave him the use of five acres of land for his own use with the lead of the machinery and horses, in return the boy was to supply the seed, and fertilizer and work for the farmer for the Summer, and he cleared over a thousand dollars, this boy will think twice before he leaves the island.

If we were all business or professional men in these Provinces I would say yes by all means get the very cheapest labor possible, BUT as over 90 per cent. of our people are farmers, that is a horse of another color and such a thing must not be permitted under any circumstances, unless those in favor of the scheme can show better reasons, than that it will lower the price of farm produce, and cause a state of affairs that there will be no market in Canada for what the people of P. E. I. grow.

A discussion through the press, without reverting to personalities, and preferably over men's own signature would be very beneficial to Winnipeg and make the mistake of their lives by thinking the farmers are behind this scheme of bringing out immigrants unless they are the better class of Britishers whose standard of living is at least equal to our own.

Ford Touring Car On Trans-Canada Tour

Completing the first trans-Canada tour made by an automobile under its own power in the history of the Dominion, the pioneering Ford touring car has reached Vancouver, B. C., after a 4,794 mile trip from Halifax.

The car left Halifax, Sept. 8 on a trip designed to stimulate building of the transcontinental Canadian highway and to direct the world's attention to Canada's wonderful scenic resources. It is fettered by blinding snow storms hundreds of miles of slushy gumbo roads and almost continuous rains he trailbreaking Ford reached Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 17.

Equipped with flanged wheels the car was despatched as a special train for 853 miles through courtesy of Canadian Pacific railway officials who tendered the use of their lines in areas lacking highways. This novel arrangement was used from Sault Ste Marie to a point near Winnipeg and in two Rocky Mountain districts.

Bearing a message from the Mayor of Halifax to the Mayor of Vancouver the car traversed country heretofore regarded as impassable for auto traffic. It was reloaded when Mayor I. D. Taylor headed a reception committee of prominent business men.
