SOME weeks ago the Chronicle announced on the authority of a prominent firm of grocers, that beans, evaporated apples and lard would likely be higher. This has come to pass. Evaporated apples are very scarce, having come under the control of a syndicate and they and New York exporters between them have almost cleared up the market. Prices have advanced a half cent, and they are now quoted at 7 cents. Canadian makers of jams have advanced prices a half cent per pound owing to the high price of sugar.—Halifax Chronicle.

THE distinct loss to the American stage which will be sustained through the retirement at the end of the present season of the beloved old actor, J. H. Stoddard, is being felt by his many friends, as well as those who have become acquainted with his gentle personality and art through the medium of his excellent portrayals of the many characters in which he had endeared himself to the theatre-going public. By the sudden and unexpected death of Mrs. Stetford Mullins, which occurred at Tryon on Saturday, 11th inst. a deep shadow of gloom has again been cast over the community, in a bright and happy home suddenly shrouded in sorrow. The deceased who was a daughter of William Rogerson, Tryon, had scarcely reached her 21st year, being called away in the bloom of youth to early dawn of motherhood. But it was naturally in the home where the wealth of her affectionate nature found fullest expression, and here her loss will be most keenly felt. McDonald who was unable to be present owing to the stormy weather and almost impassable roads. The pallbearers were John Howatt, Camden Holland, B. N. Leard, Wright Lord, Russell A. Howatt, and Harry Howatt. Besides a father and mother a large circle of relatives, there are left a husband and infant daughter to mourn their irreparable loss. Much sympathy is felt for the stricken family in their sudden and sore bereavement.

EASTERN NOTES.—Furious snow-storms, severe cold, drifted roads, irregular and long delayed mails and all the inconveniences incidental to Arctic weather have been experienced by us so far this winter, in common with all eastern North America, and in all probability these conditions will prevail here for some time, on account of the vast body of ice formed in our gulf and straits, whose chilling and freezing influences will be imparted to our atmosphere and our weather. THE many friends of Mrs. S. Gillespie, Royalty, will be pleased to learn that her ten year old son Charles, who had the misfortune to break his leg by jumping from the barn loft window about five weeks ago, is steadily improving.

It is estimated that the snow fighting operations on the railway during the past two or three weeks have cost for the labor of the men alone at an average of \$1,000 a day. To this must be added the cost of provisioning the men, extra expenditure of coal, damage to the engines, and overtime of the train hands.

THE remains of the late Donald Crockett, Ex-supervisor, York, were laid at rest in York Cemetery Wednesday afternoon Feb. 15. The funeral procession was one of the largest ever seen in that part of the country, thus evidencing the high esteem in which the late Mr. Crockett was held in the community. His parents emigrated from Dumfries landing at Miramichi where the deceased was born 84 years ago. However he spent most of his life in York and was always foremost in every good work, being a consistent member of the Methodist Church many years. Two sons Major, John on the homestead, and Mrs. Deacon, Grenfel, N. W. T. survive him; his wife and three daughters, Mrs. Sam Worth, Elizabeth and Maggie, having predeceased him some years ago. The Rev. G. F. Dawson officiated at the funeral, the pallbearers being Geo. Vessey, Wm. Vessey, Henry Hardy, Isaac Brynston, A. Proud, A. Brown.

THE Picot Standard to hand Saturday after two weeks delay, gives the following additional particulars of the destruction of the Bevere Hotel in that town: "Miss Strang, a P. E. Island lady, who was sleeping in the next flat below, also leaped from the window of her room, and was considerably injured. She and the Misses O'Neill and Sears made their way to the Kirkwood House and are now in the Cottage Hospital. Mr. Parkins was very nearly overcome, but he braced up and made a rope of the bed-clothing, by which he swung himself to the flat below, where Mr. LeLacheur was, and from there they were both rescued by the rope thrown by firemen from Hamilton's factory. Mr. Parkins' hand is badly burned from having slipped on the rope, and has not yet fully recovered from the shock. Mr. Whitman, Mr. Green, Mr. Waas, and three young men from P. E. I., who were sleeping in the north end of the building, also had narrow escapes and have lost much, and in some cases all clothing. Mr. Whitman jumped on the hard sidewalk and received quite a shaking up, besides being cut on the leg, probably by broken glass. The only ones who escaped without much difficulty were Mr. Thompson, L. C. R. driver and the office boys. Several statements might be safely made in connection with this fire, among them that if the alarm had been given 10 or 15 minutes later that many, if not all, in the building would have perished. That were it not for prompt response and hard work of the Fire Brigade and Hook & Ladder Co., much more property would have been consumed. The Bevere was estimated worth \$30,000. We have no learned how much of this is covered by insurance."

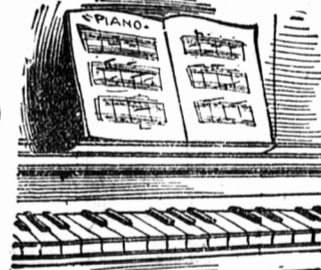
