SILVER BLACK FOX PRODUCTION FOR 1916 IN P. E. ISLAND

In the Daily Consular and Trade Reports issued by the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, Department of Commerce, Washington, appears the following report from U. S. Consul Pearce of Charlottetown:

"Domestic foxes are mated for breeding purposes about January 1st and reared a pair to the pen. The six months from then to June 30th covers the most critical period in the breeding of foxes. After mating takes place comes the period of gestation covering 51 days. During this time all unusual sights or noises are kept from the foxes so far as this is possible.

"The whelping season, speaking generally, covers the time from the middle of March to June 1st. The earliest known litter came on March 12th and the latest on June 4th.

"Reports are now coming in from individual ranches showing the production for the present season and from these reports fairly accurate estimates for the province can be made up. Five representative statements from large ranches show: 49 pups from 16 litters; 53 pups from 13 litters; 31 pups from 7 litters; 44 young from 12 litters; 16 pups from 4 litters. An increase of 100 per cent. in the number of foxes is indicated by these figures. As there are by available data known to be 1200 pairs of standard bred silver black foxes and 800 pairs of silver not classed as standard matings this season on the Island, a 100 per cent. increase will mean 4000 foxes for the production of the season. The natural increase will, however, be reduced by certain causes.

"These are, principally, that the mother fox, from inherent wildness, may destroy her litter or a part of it, or, from fright bury them alive. And also, certain diseases, chiefly worms, will infest the young fox life and take the lives of some. The first trouble spoken of is greatly checked by good ranchers, by means of vigilant but discreet watching of the ranches by caretakers and the other trouble, that of disease, is met by prompt and judicious treatment.

"Information thus far in hand and a careful study of the experience of past years warrant an estimate of 3500 pups as the production of Prince Edward Island for 1916."
