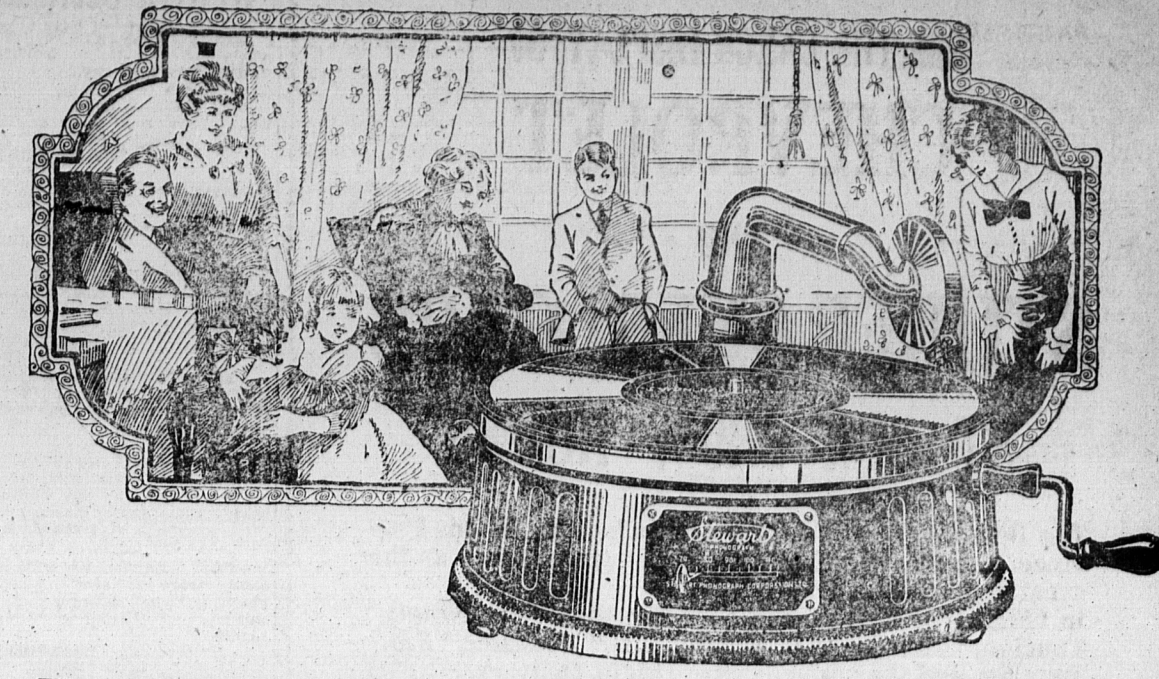

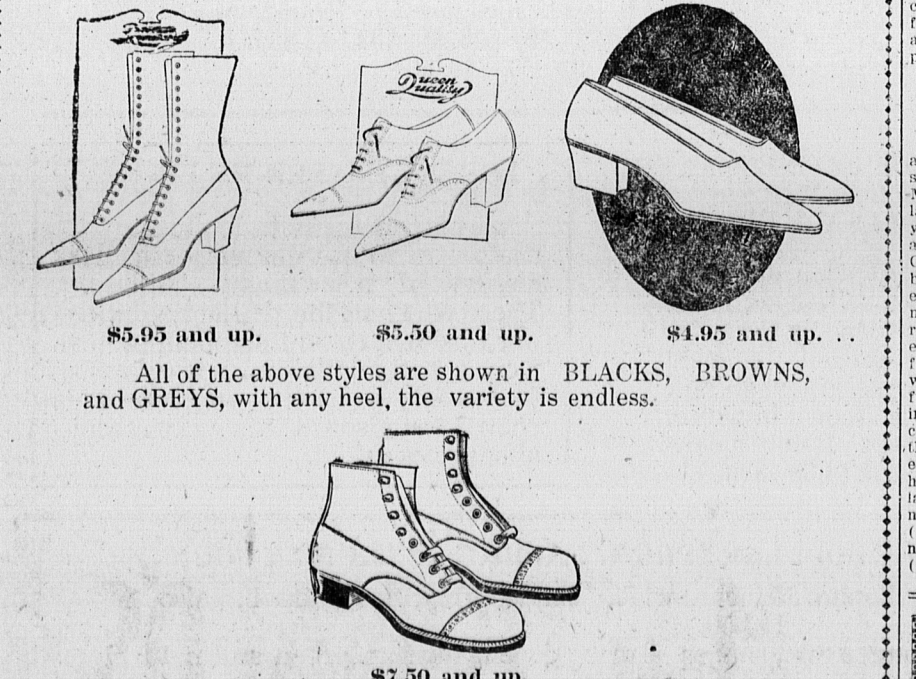
**NOTED BRITISH AIRPLANE MAKERS IN CANADA.**  
TORONTO, March 22.—Sir Handley Page, the noted British airplane manufacturer, who arrived in the city yesterday, said in an interview that he was not here to sell airplanes, but to see the country, of which his friends, Colonels Bishop and Barker, had spoken about so enthusiastically. He said Canada had some of the world's best pilots, but there was disappointment that the close of the war had not brought a tremendous development in commercial aviation. It was up to the government and municipalities, Sir Handley said, to construct landing places and air routes and to map out the air routes. "All we can do is supply and man the machines," he added.
