THE SWANSEA TRADER—The S. Swansea Trader arrived in Charlottetown Thursday night with a large general cargo. She sailed again at noon yesterday with a cargo consisting chiefly of potatoes.

KIND TO THE KIDDIES—Mr. H. S. Crane, the popular travelling passenger agent of the Plant Steamship Company, well known in Charlottetown, while in Sydney Wednesday became interested in the S. Swansea contest and making a purchase at one of the city stores entitling him to 2,500 votes handed the ballots to a charming little girl contestant of the city.

MR. NEWCOMBE'S VISIT—THE district Secretary of the Bible Society Rev. A. F. Newcombe, has completed a four weeks trip in this province. Mr. Newcombe wishes to publicly express his gratitude to many who assisted him in forming branches of the Bible Society and regrets, owing to pressure of work in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Newfoundland, he could not remain longer in this beautiful and hospitable province. The Rev. Mr. Newcombe found the work very encouraging, and addressed about thirty meetings, during the last four weeks.

OLDEST SCHOONER—Perhaps the oldest vessel ever to undergo repairs on the marine railway in North Sydney was the schooner Baltic, owned by Mr. J. G. Scrimgeour, of Cardigan, P. E. I., which is now having some repairs caused by an accident while the craft was going through the new bridge at Charlottetown. The Baltic was built in Essex, Mass., in 1866, and is of white oak. Her hull is as good almost as it was fifty-seven years ago, notwithstanding the fact that the half century old vessel had many a hard voyage in almost every climate.

SHEEP DIPPING—Mr. Walter Shaw, who has been in charge of the sheep dipping outfit in the western part of the Province, returned yesterday to Charlottetown. He reports great interest having been taken in the dipping demonstrations. Sheep are not as plentiful in some sections as they used to be, and among the reasons given by the people among whom Mr. Shaw has been working is the "fear of the dog." Mr. Shaw returns west on Monday, and will give demonstrations at Victoria West on the farm of Mr. William McArthur on Monday afternoon and Tuesday morning; on Wednesday at Springfield, Lot 8, on the farm of Mr. Daniel Currie; and on Thursday at Glenwood on the farm of Mr. A. W. Boyle. All sheep are dipped free of cost and everyone are invited to bring in their sheep and have them dipped in a modern way.

POLICE SWORN IN—Mr. Joseph Augustia McAlamy, who has been appointed to the Police force to this city was sworn into office yesterday morning.

LOOKING FOR RECRUITS—There are at present in Charlottetown two units of the Order of St. Ann, of British Columbia, and several Sisters of Mercy from Devil's Lake, North Dakota, U. S. A. The purpose of their long journey to this place is interesting; they are in search of recruits for their respective Orders.

INTERESTING RELICS—Unknown to perhaps most people in Charlottetown at the grounds on the Brighton Road of the Militia Ordnance Department are to be found two interesting relics of ancient history, in the shape of two field-pieces of antiquated muzzle-loading type. They are six-pounders and are mounted on very heavy gun-carriages. One gun is over a hundred years old while the other is ninety-nine years old, and is certain to see the century as, like its companion, today it appears as good and stout as ever. This says something for the reliability of the work of our forefathers. The guns are made of solid gun-metal of evidently the best quality; stout, solid pieces capable of the hardest tax on their durability. The guns were apparently made in the reign of George III, and for all one knows they have never been service at Waterloo. There are engravings on both which the process of time has not served to obliterate, and from which the information as to their age is derived. The date stamped on one gun, near the breach is 1805, and that on the other, 1814; while both bear a shield created by a crown, encircled by the motto, "Eion so it qui mal y pense," with 3 G. R. engraved in monogram form in the centre of the shield, on both guns near the muzzle are other crested engravings. In one case it consists of a wreath of oak leaves, crested by a coronet with the letter M in the centre; while in the case of the other gun, this engraving is of plain design, oval-shaped, also coronet crested and with the letter C in the centre, encircled by the famous motto of the Order of the Garter, as quoted above.

ORDNANCE DEPARTMENT—There has just been completed at the Ordnance store on the Brighton road the erection of an arms stand which is intended to accommodate a thousand new rifles that are expected here shortly in order to augment the equipment of the militia department. The stand has been built in an exceptionally clever manner; with wooden caps on spring attachments which will clamp down on the muzzles it will be possible for the rifles to be kept in a perfectly perpendicular position, without any undue strain or pressure on any particular part of it. The local Ordnance department also expects a new draft of big guns; the mark pattern of that type of fifteen-pounders of which there is already a half-battery here, and which are used in the firing of salutes. The new draft will also be a half-battery in strength to accommodate the new guns, and in fact all the guns at the Ordnance department, it is intended to put a roof of the building frame which at present stands on the north side of the grounds and is a blot on the otherwise attractive appearance of the place, and make a proper gush of it.
